## FISH TRAPS CLAIMED TO BE A MENACE

A petition asking for the abolition of fish traps in Alaska waters is being circulated among the natives of the coast by O. M. Pley, a fisherman. Other petitions are being generally circulated with the same object in view. It is claimed that the fish traps are a menace to the food supply of the natives, and that under the present system they threaten to deplete the waters of salmon and thus seriously injure a most important industry and deprive many white, as well as native fishermen, of the means of making a livelihood.

The petitions will be presented to Congress and the territorial legislature, and a native delegation, it is said will go to Washington.
