A YOUNG DON JUAN AND A WIDOW OF KAKE

George J. Beck, the newly appointed court commissioner for the precinct of Kake, some distance to the southward, has brought a problem to the district attorney's office that would certainly have taxed the genius of a Portia. It has all of those elements that enter into the modern "problem play," albeit that the actors in this drama of intense interest are of the dusky aboriginal race.

The story as told in a letter dated at Kake, Nov. 18, and addressed to District Attorney Rustgard in person, recites that there is at the present time a native widow in Kake, the mother of several children, who has just given birth to another child. The woman, so the letter continues, accuses a boy of the town, aged 17 last June, of being the father of the child. The woman charges that this boy came to her house and by smooth language and the promise of marriage won her regard.

The woman is about 40 years of age. The youth blames the woman. The parents of the young man insist that he is too young to marry. The boy is one of the few natives who has his name recorded in the family bible.

"Both sides came to me as the missionary," says Commissioner Beck, but have not asked for a trial. And then he asks: "Now what is my duty in the matter and under what section can I find the case, if I am forced to bring it to trial?" And then he adds: "It is so hard to make the law apply in some cases." Judge Beck was evidently considerably in doubt about the evidence, too, for he says: "It is hard to think that a chaste female of forty or more could be deceived by a boy of seventeen and a half."

The district attorney gave the commissioner the law on the case and at the same time advised him that it would be a difficult matter to induce the morals of natives by applying the penal code in such cases.

CHICAGO MINE IS WORKING STEADILY.

The Chichagof Mining Company on Chichagof island is a steady producer and will probably continue to operate all winter unless heavy snows and frost intervenes, according to J. A. Gibson who has been connected with the electrical department of the mine for the last two years. Mr. Gibson was in town today en route to his home in Seattle.

ALASKA COPPER MINING CO.

The Alaska Copper Mining Company, which has a property at Sum Dum, has been organized by H. Ahrenstedt and others, and stock will be sold locally for the purpose of securing funds to continue development work. The mine carries gold, silver and copper, with values ranging from \$15 to \$200 and \$300 a ton, the assays showing high values in silver and copper.

A good deal of actual development work has been done on the property. One shaft is down 100 feet below sea level, and another it to be sunk on an ore body from 12 to 15 feet wide, which carries good values in gold, silver and copper. It is expected that after sinking 200 feet a good deal of ore will be taken out and shipped to the Tacoma smelter. Mr. Ahrenstedt has held the property for 12 years and has every confidence in its future. It is admirably located at tidewater, at Sum Dum where there are excellent shipping facilities. A number of local men are interesting themselves in the company. All the necessary machinery for developing the mine is now on the ground.

HOISTING ENGINE MOVED.

The hoisting engine of the Alaska-Juneau Company was moved from the plank roadway to its winter location yesterday afternoon. Billy Pitts, the engineer, handled the engine very neatly while making the climb up the steep hill.
