MR. WICKERSHAM EN ROUTE SOUTH

James Wickersham, delegate from Alaska to Congress is a passenger on the Mariposa enroute to Washington.

Mr. Wickersham is very optimistic in speaking of the future of Fairbanks. "The country never looked better," he said, "there are 12 or 13 stamp mills pounding away and the little mines are growing bigger all the time."

"I don't expect much from the short session of Congress," said the delegate, "but I shall do the best I can. It will be my purpose to push legislation relative to the development of our coal lands and for the construction of railroads."

"Yes, I hope to get some results from the present Congress on these two subjects but I think little will be accomplished for Alaska's good until the new administration comes in. Alaska must look to the Democrats for the needed relief."

"Nothing can be done in the matter of coal and railroad legislation especially the latter, until after the committee reports."

Calling the delegate's attention to the problem of providing a place for the legislature to meet and the lack of contingent funds to pay the hall rent and other incidentals, brought forth the reply: "The bill provides for all that."

Asked about legislation on the Alaska fisheries and game questions, the delegate had nothing to say further than to hint that if legislation was needed he would try and get it.

The delegate will stop in Seattle a few days he said and then go direct to Washington.
