**A Western Pioneer
and Good Citizen**

Martin Barrett, the Katalla pion-
eer, who died a few days ago at that
place, had a picturesque career. He
was an Indian scout for the United
States army in Utah and other parts
of the West more than fifty years
ago. In 1897 with his family he left
Snobomish, Wash., in a small schooner
and was shipwrecked on Middle-
ton island, where the winter was
spent, the family having but short
rations, to which were added such
fish that could be caught and mus-
sels that were found. In 1897 he
settled at Katalla and engaged busi-
ness. Mr. Barrett had the reputa-
tion of being a square man in all
his dealings and had the respect of
his fellow citizens. He was a na-
tive of Ireland but came to the
United States while a small boy.
