Sparks From Douglas

DOUGLAS, Dec. 2.—The Dolphin went South at noon today.

The funeral of Francis Forrest Richards, who died in Seattle last Monday, was held yesterday at 2 p. m., from St. Luke's Episcopal church. A large number of friends attended. The services were conducted by Rev. G. Renison, of Juneau.

Miss Cassie King is suffering from neuralgia.

Mrs. Wm. Stubbins and Miss Doris Oliver will be home tomorrow, on the Spokane, after a trip of several weeks in the Sound cities.

All schools have closed in Douglas and Treadwell, on account of the scarlet fever epidemic. The schools will probably be closed until after the holidays.

The show at the Treadwell Club, which was postponed last Saturday night, owing to the death of Francis Richards, will take place this evening; children under sixteen years of age, will not be allowed at any of the show houses, skating rinks, or any public gathering until the present scare of scarlet fever abates.

Miss Lillian Liljestrand is returning on the Spokane tomorrow.

This is a good time for the youngsters to save their money for Christmas since they can't spend it for public amusements.

The following took passage on the Dolphin: Sam Vovich, Henry Monroe, Nick L. Lee, T. Tahallashi, Paul Caster, S. Vakovich, R. Pignonovich, S. Dahovashi, Nick Chorovich.

N. G. Neville will move into the house formerly occupied by M. G. Rogers and family. Mr. and Mrs. Neville have been living in the Congregational parsonage for the last year.

Nick S. Lee, a Treadwell employee for several years, left for the Sound on the steamer Dolphin.

The City Council held a special meeting yesterday to determine what action should be taken to prevent the spread of scarlet fever. From their investigation it is apparent that the blame for the spread of this epidemic can be laid to Dr. Dr. Weyerhorst, who, it is alleged, did not report his cases to the City Council as he should have done and as all the other physicians have done, and it is up to the council to see that all men, practitioners and others, comply with the law.

ANOTHER BIG MINING DEAL

The Jersey City group of claims on Douglas island were on last Saturday bonded to W. G. Stegman, of Juneau, representing Eastern capitalists. Negotiations for the transfer of this property have been under way for the past month. During that time the property was thoroughly examined with very satisfactory results.

Few people outside of Douglas Island and know of the Jersey City group, as the owners have quietly and patiently, but optimistically performed their assessment work for the past seventeen years with a firm and abiding faith that sooner or later they would not have to seek a purchaser, as the merits of the claims would bring him their way. That time has arrived and the Jersey City group might be said to have passed the prospect stage. The development work done on these claims to date consists of a shaft eighty feet, a cross cut forty feet and a drift twenty-nine feet, all in pay ore.

The ore body differs somewhat from Treadwell though running parallel to that great deposit, and being only one-half mile distant. The formation is exactly the same as Treadwell, being a contact ledge between the slate and gneiss, but the Jersey City carries its greatest values in free gold. Some of the richest specimens ever found in Alaska quartz were taken out of the drift last summer.

The Jersey City group was located in 1896 by James Mitchell, Joe McKone and "Cordwood Jim." The present owners are M. J. O'Connor and James Mitchell, of Douglas; S. Zenger and Wm. Meyer, of Juneau.

According to the terms of the bond active development work must begin on May 1, and the day is not far distant when Douglas Island will have another producing mine.

The papers transferring the property were signed Saturday and the deed is held in escrow by the First National bank, of Juneau, to be delivered to its rightful owners on November 30, 1913.

The Swan freighter Bertha, Capt. Knight, arrived at 8 o'clock yesterday evening bringing 140 tons of coal for Juneau. She was scheduled to leave this afternoon for Skagway.

The Cordova, Capt. Fred Warner, arrived at the City dock at 7:15 last night and commenced discharging 250 tons of coal for Juneau. The Cordova has coal for Valdez and Seward and expected to leave late this afternoon.

The Dolphin arrived from Skagway at 10:20 this morning having on aboard the Vidette when she was gers who were caught in the ice. The Dolphin sailed South at 11:30.

The Spokane is due from the South tomorrow.

The Princess May is due coming North tomorrow and will sail for the South on the night of Dec. 5.

Klukwan Band to Play in Juneau

When the Spokane arrives in Juneau on her next trip southbound the town of Juneau will be invaded by the tribe of Klukwan. The invaders will number half a hundred all told, and they will be led ashore by Chief Yath-Hoch himself.

The purpose of this visit is to give pleasure to the people of Juneau. The party will consist of two divisions—the Klukwan brass band, twenty-five pieces in the hands of native musicians; the other division contains twenty-five artists who have been specially trained for this stage performance.

The entertainment features have been thoroughly rehearsed and will be presented in Juneau for the first time. The show will be both entertaining and instructive. There will be folklore songs by these sons and daughters of Boras; dancing and acting, and special features galore. The artists garbed in the ancient costumes of their tribe will present the old rites and ceremonies—there will be an exposition of witchcraft. The special feature of the show will be the enactment of the scene attending the landing of the first white man's ship at Sitka.

The people will take the Spokane at Haines and arrive here in time to give their show Saturday night, Dec. 7. Elks' hall has already been secured for the performance.

FAIRBANKS MAN SOUTHBOUND ON DOLPHIN.

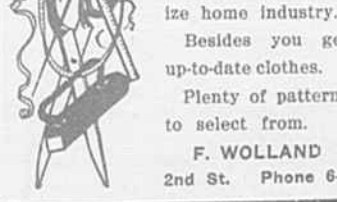
