JIMMY JAMES FOUND GUILTY

After a hard struggle, Jimmy James, Indian, was yesterday convicted of giving liquor to other Indians. The liquor according to the evidence in case was manufactured by defendant in defiance of the internal revenue laws, therefore was guilty of a double felony.

James is from Hootnah and had been suspected of manufacturing this "hootch" or moonshine liquor for several months. At least after one big carousal or drunk orgie he and several witnesses were arrested.
James is only one of several Indians known to be engaged in the unlawful making of alcoholic liquors and the government special agents are determined to break up the business.

The fearful compound classed as "hootch" that brought Jimmy James to ruin is a fermented liquor drawn from very simple ingredients—prunes, potatoes, flour, sugar, yeast and water.
Special Agent L. J. Harding says that a large percentage of the lawbreaking and drunken debauchery among the natives can be directly traced to the unlawfully manufactured liquor, made by Indians.
