**COMPARE THIS WITH U. S. AID IN ALASKA**

The magnitude of the bureau of printing of the Philippine islands, located at Manila, is probably not realized by many. The bureau furnishes all of the printing and binding for a nation of 800,000 people, besides local army and navy stations. Among its customers during the last year was the Imperial Chinese government. It furnishes printing and binding for the Philippine legislature, seventy-three bureaus and offices, thirty-eight provinces and 725 municipalities of the Philippine government. It operates 20 modern linotypes; thirty cylinder, platen and embossing presses; 48 book-binding machines; 25 stereotyping and electrotyping machines; a photo-engraving plant equipped for line, half-tone and process work, and a machine shop. Six thousand six hundred articles of equipment and 3,500 different kinds of materials and supplies are in daily use. The plant is valued at \$600,000. With the exception of a score or more of instructors from the United States, the product of the plant is the work of natives.

**Marine Notes**

The Yukon arrived in port last night at 10:30 and left for the Westward at midnight.

The Admiral Sampson will leave Seattle for the Westward via Juneau on March 5.

The Yukon is due in Juneau from the Westward, southbound on Feb. 18.

The Curacao will be at Treadwell at 3 a. m. tomorrow arriving in Juneau before noon.

The Princess May will arrive from the South on Feb. 12.

The Alameda is scheduled to take the Northwestern's place sailing from Seattle on Feb. 8.

The Jefferson will sail from Seattle on Feb. 7.

**STEAMSHIP LINES GOING TO SEATTLE**

The Royal Mail Steam Packet line, the most powerful steamship corporation in the world, has completed plans for sending the vessels of its fleet to Seattle and North Pacific ports.

Frank Waterhouse has received a cablegram from London stating that it had been definitely decided to inaugurate monthly sailings from Europe via the Suez canal and the Orient to Seattle, Victoria, Vancouver and Portland.

The new service will be inaugurated by the British steamship Monmouthshire, which will sail from London on May 7 for Seattle and North Pacific ports via the Suez canal and the Orient.

Seattle, instead of San Francisco, may become the Pacific Coast terminal of the annual round-the-world passenger tours of the Hamburg-American liner Cleveland. H. F. Dergeloh, Pacific Coast manager of the line, is dissatisfied with the treatment accorded his company at San Francisco and has announced that unless conditions are changed there he may accept the better inducements afforded at Seattle.

The trouble arises because of objections of the San Francisco board of state harbor commissioners to the Hamburg-American line's plans for handling baggage belonging to the passenger.
