John Kildall Petersburg cannery man, arrived in Juneau on the Curacao and is stopping at the Occidental. Jack Chamberlain, and Wm. Alken are in Petersburg and will be up on the next Jefferson.

Marine Notes

The Curacao arrived from the South at 10:30 this morning. She has a lot of freight for Treadwell and will not get away for the North before morning.

The Georgia arrived from Sitka and way ports today at 10 o'clock. She brought 12 boxes of halibut from Sitka and 20 boxes from Hoonah.

The Mariposa is due from the Westward Feb. 11.

The Alameda will not sail from Seattle February 8 as scheduled; instead the Northwestern sails Feb. 9 and is due here Feb. 12.

The Diriga sails from Seattle Feb. 12 with explosives.

The Cordova is due from the South today.

The Jefferson sails from Seattle tomorrow and is due in Juneau Feb. 11.

The fishing schooner Highland Queen and Vesta arrived from the banks this morning.

The Georgia leaves for Skagway and way ports tomorrow morning.

SAM KOHN THE TOY OF TAKU ZEPHYR

Many people were awakened last night by the shaking of buildings and the fierce howling of the Taku as it swept over the town. Most people felt thankful that it was night and that they were in good comfortable beds, rather than facing the blasts on the streets or out on the channel in a small boat.

Nightwatchman Sam Kohn was not one of the fortunate on this occasion. He has to do certain things in order to get the municipal pay check every month. His duties include regular trips down the line at stated intervals throughout the night. It is seldom pleasant—this work, but it is always interesting. Last night was more than interesting. It was exciting!

About two o'clock the Taku was trying its worst, and it did—to Sam.

While on lower Franklin street, near the Shattuck mill Sam was lifted off his feet by the terrific force of the wind. He went hurtling through space for a distance of thirty feet and was then slammed down on the plank roadway. As a result of the sudden impact both of Mr. Kohn's legs have ugly flesh wounds and painful bruises. Sam says this Taku zephyr was about the quickest woolley that ever came over the hill.

He is figuring on getting an anchor made for use during the Taku season.
