PROGRESSIVE MEASURES BEFORE LEGISLATURE

THE Alaska Legislature is not shying at the consideration of legislation such as has become known throughout the country as progressive. Yesterday the House passed the woman suffrage bill, one of the measures that advocates of the "uplift" expect much from, and there were introduced in the Senate bills regulating lobbying and stock-selling.

If the Allies are not coerced into accepting a settlement of the Balkan war that is distasteful to them, as Japan was coerced in the peace negotiations with Russia a few years back, there will be little of Turkey left in Europe.

DO NOT WAIT FOR A VISITING COMMITTEE

THE proposal that a joint committee of the United States Senate and House of Representatives visit Alaska should not be pressed too hard until it is discovered whether or not the powers that be can be persuaded to take up Alaska matters at the special session of Congress.

Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane knew what he was talking about when he said that it would be unnecessary for him to make a trip to Alaska to determine what would be his course in the affairs of the Territory.

Of course, we would like to have a committee of Congress come to Alaska. We would royally welcome all the members of the Senate and House if they would give us the chance to.

However, gentlemen in authority, do not wait for all this to be brought about before taking up Alaska questions. We are ready to take a chance on our ability to make you see our way, and we have faith in you.

It was appropriate that the woman suffrage bill should be the first measure to go through a house of the Alaska Legislature. Alaskans are nothing if not gallant.

WASHINGTON WILL STAND BY ALASKA

THERE are many faithful servants of Democracy that would like to become patriotic Alaskans if they could come to the territory with official commissions tightly locked in their hand bags. Of that we are given evidence daily.

SEATTLE DEMOCRATS TRY TO HELP ALASKA

A resolution urging President Woodrow Wilson to take immediate action in matters of vital interest to Alaska was adopted at a largely attended meeting of the King County Democratic Club last Saturday.

The resolution was drawn by P. H. Watt, formerly of Nome, and speeches urging its adoption were made by Maurice D. Leehy, of Seattle, and John L. Steel, of Landlock, Alaska.

WHEREAS, Despite the fact that the Territory of Alaska has never been given proper consideration by the government at Washington, but has been hampered by unjust restrictions which have hindered the development of its marvelous resources, and prevented its progress, yet, during the forty-six years of American occupancy, it has

added \$500,000,000 to the wealth of the United States, and, WHEREAS, The first recognition of justice to Alaska was given when the Democratic party following its principles of self-government, forced the passage of a law creating a territorial Legislature for Alaska, and,

WHEREAS, A definite government policy is necessary to promote the development of Alaska, and some definite course should be adopted by the government without further delay, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, By the King County Democratic Club of Seattle, Washington, as follows: 1.—That we deeply appreciate the action initiated by the Democratic House of Representatives in the last Congress.

2.—That we respectfully urge upon the President that he recommend to Congress that the consideration of Alaska affairs be made a part of the program for the special session, to the

end that definite government policy, as liberal as possible, but definite in any event, be promptly established for the development of the natural resources of Alaska, especially the coal deposits, and that railroads be constructed from the Pacific Coast of Alaska to the great interior waterways.

MANY CHANGES IN CUSTOMS DISTRICTS

The customs house reorganization regulations that will go into effect July 1, make important changes on the Pacific Coast.

The District of Puget Sound has been changed to the District of Washington, and the customs headquarters removed from Port Townsend to Seattle. Port Townsend becomes a sub-port along with Aberdeen, Anacortes, Bellingham, Blaine, Choepka, Danville, Everett, Ferry, Friday Harbor, Laurier, Molson and Northport, Port Angeles, Roche Harbor, South Bend, Sumas and Tacoma.

The customs districts of Coos Bay, Astoria, Yaquina and Portland in Oregon have been consolidated as the District of Oregon, headquarters at Astoria.
