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A QUESTION OF THE NATIVE AND THE BALLOT

THERE are two bills before the Legislature dealing with Indian Suffrage. One of them, by Senator Millard, deprives the natives of any rights they may have in the premises unless they shall have severed their tribal relations, and taken up the white man's method of living, and unless they can read and write the English language.

This is a question that deserves consideration, and the desideratum, unquestionably, is the restriction of native voting to a minimum, if, indeed, it shall be permitted at all for some years to come. Notwithstanding the really excellent progress that is being made in the education and development of the Alaska natives there are very few of them that have anything approaching such a conception of governmental affairs that it would make them intelligent voters, and it would be decidedly unfair to those of them that do not possess it and to those whose work is among them to make of them a football in Alaska politics.

The attitude of the new administration toward Alaska problems, as indicated by the desire to take them up and settle them along constructive lines, could not be more satisfactory to the people of this Territory.

THE PATHOS OF "UNCLE JOE'S" RETIREMENT

THERE is something rather pathetic about the retirement of "Uncle Joe" Cannon and the way he takes it. Notwithstanding that he takes with him into private life world's goods and personal friendships in quantity that would make most men feel rich beyond deserts, Cannon quit Washington reluctantly. He lingered at the national capital several weeks after his official life had ceased to be. He left a theater of action from which all that he had stood for and fought valiant battles for during the whole long length of his strenuous lifetime has been discarded. He witnessed the incoming of an administration that, professedly at least, stands for the common good of all rather than the benefit of its friends. He heard the acclaim of approval that greeted the summons issued by President Wilson to all the forces of humanity, and he felt the heartfelt thanks of a whole nation when the new President assured the people that he will not fail them if they will but counsel and sustain him.

Does the refusal of President Wilson to force the Chinese government to let American bankers in on the profits of their national loan mean that there is an early eclipse in store for "Dollar Diplomacy?"
