P. D. WINTERS KILLED IN SAN FRANCISCO

Patrick D. Winters, Nome pioneer who sold to the Pioneer Mining Company the famous Portland bench properties on Little River, that gave second life to the big Seward peninsula mining company, was killed as the result of an accident in San Francisco week before last.

"Patrick D. Winters, aged Alaska pioneer, died yesterday at his home, 1288 Page street, from injuries received Thursday when thrown from a buggy at Thirty-third avenue and Fulton street.

"Winters, with James O'Sullivan, 1402 Market street, were riding through the park and as they went out in Fulton street, the horse shied and the buggy was overturned. Winters being pinned beneath. His skull was fractured. O'Sullivan escaped with minor injuries.
