ANOTHER FAIRBANKS QUARTZ STRIKE

FAIRBANKS, March 24.—Eighteen tons of golden ore averaging 70 to the ton netted a total of \$1,200 to the owners of the Homestake property on Wolf creek yesterday. The amalgam was brought in from the creek yesterday afternoon by A. W. Balsimer, the staker of the claim, and was returned last evening by L. M. Drury.

The result is very satisfactory to the owners of the claim, for it means a continuation of the same kind of ore as was mined some months ago. The first run made this winter averaged \$77 to the ton.

The tunnel on the stringer, which has a width of from ten to twelve inches, is now 250 feet in length. The main tunnel is in the hill a distance of 750 feet, but no ledges are being worked from it. Two men are being worked at the property now.

DEMOCRATIC PANIC NOT IN SIGHT

No Democratic panic is in sight for the United States, notwithstanding the fact that three and a half months have passed since the election of Woodrow Wilson and three weeks since his induction into the office of president.

Among hard-headed business men who could see no rhyme, reason nor sense in the prophecies made when Wilson was elected, that the country would proceed at once into bankruptcy, is N. P. Solner, cashier of the Union Trust & Savings Company, of this city.

He said last fall when the result of the election became known that the business of the country, as a whole, was satisfactory, and that it would be insanity to allow a handful of curb-brokers in New York to scare the United States into a panic by bidding call money to the skies.

Mr. Solner spent weeks conferring with the most prominent bankers of the country early this year, and has returned to Seattle more fully convinced than ever that business, left to itself, not tampered with by manipulators is in splendid condition.

A special bulletin from the First National Bank, of Boston, under date of March 15, is therefore especially pleasing to him. He calls attention of the Times to the following extract.

"New England is maintaining a volume of business substantially larger than at this time last year. The improvement in business sentiment, which becomes noticeable in February, continues. In general, demand is large, while supply is being held in control by business men who are endeavoring to give due weight to the several adverse factors in the situation. In most lines of New England industry the new tariff has been largely discounted, and matters put in shape for the 'operation.' It is commonly conceded that if tariff revision must take place, it could not come at a more opportune period. The much-talked of general falling off in business has thus far failed to materialize. In its place has come a slight relaxation of conservatism, the statistics recording a slightly freer movement in trade."

The extract quoted is a complete and convincing answer to alarmists. It is also a rebuke to the numerous gentry who crawl into their holes and take the money with them every time the country elects a Democratic president.—Seattle Times.
