DIRECT ELECTION OF SENATORS IS ACCOMPLISHED

IT IS an old saying that "a new broom sweeps clean," and that might be the explanation of the rapidity with which Democratic State legislatures have acted upon the constitutional amendment providing for the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people.

When the President proclaims the new amendment it will become the 17th amendment to the Constitution, and the second to be adopted since the ratification of the 15th amendment.

President Wilson has promised a whole evening to Alaska. That is particularly refreshing when we consider that something usually happens when Mr. Wilson devotes his personal attention to it.

THE RELATION OF THE PRESIDENCY TO CONGRESS

PRESIDENT WILSON has taken the larger view of the duties of the Presidency. He has taken the position that the constitutional provisions that make it the duty of the President to advise Congress from time to time as to what he thinks it should do and to sign or veto bills as he sees his duty place responsibility upon the President for legislation as well as upon Congress, and that it, therefore, becomes his duty to confer with and assist members of the Senate and House of Representatives in the preparation of legislation.

President Taft followed the other policy, particularly in the first part of his administration. He assumed that the legislative and executive branches of the government are entirely separate, and he did not regard himself as a part of the legislative branch.

President Wilson has determined to make his administration one of accomplishment, and he has set about the work in the manner that he and other capable Governors have found so effective in the regeneration of State governments.

The Greek people have accepted their new King Constantine as the fulfillment of prophecies that are 500 years old in their kingdom. Since the death of the last Constantine, in 1453, that terminated the Byzantine rulers, it has been a saying in Greece that in good time there would come out of Greece another Constantine that would establish his court at Constantinople.

The sympathy of the average citizen is with California in the effort to adopt legislation that will prevent the establishment within her borders of alien farming communities. The matter, in-so-far as American internal affairs are concerned, is one over which the State has complete jurisdiction, and the disposition of Japan to interfere with the local affairs of Western States is becoming tiresome.

GOLD STRIKE MADE AT HOT SPRINGS

A discovery of some importance to this camp is reported to have been made recently on Sullivan creek in the Manley Hot Springs district. The pay was located by Adolph Bock, with his drill, and it is said to prospect as high as \$20 to the foot. The discovery was made on what is known as the Wagner fraction which is owned by Fred Wagner, and is about two miles below the town of Tofty.

In all, four drill holes were put down on the claim, three of them showing the pay. These holes are all within a distance of 150 feet, so it is certain that pay is that wide.—Fairbanks Times.

HARD FIGHT FOR MARYLAND SENATOR

BALTIMORE, April 8.—W. Cabell Bruce, who was one of the leaders among the original Wilson men of Maryland and worked in season and out to bring about his nomination for president, announced his candidacy to the senate before the legislature to succeed Senator W. P. Jackson, who was appointed to succeed the late Senator Isador Rayner. He will be opposed by Blair Lee, a member of the famous Virginia family of that name. Lee is the Democratic leader in the state senate and competed with Young Gorman for the Democratic nomination for governor last year. Lee, also, is a progressive Democrat. Both Bruce and Lee have sought to secure the influence of President Wilson, but the president has announced that he will take no part in the contest.

It is said that the president has expressed the hope that Marbury will be successful in defeating Senator John Walter Smith for the seat now occupied by the latter.
