A FINE NEW ENGLAND TYPE

THE death of D. H. Gilman at Pasadena Monday removes from the activities of life a man that was a fine type of those dominating, resistless, shrewd, resourceful New England characters that, finding the limitations of their own tight little section of the country too small, came West and developed empires.

THE ORPHANS' APPROPRIATION

THE appropriation bill that the Legislature is fast whipping into shape carries an item of \$5,000 for the care of orphan children and the children of indigent parents. The item, though small, is probably more than will be required.

THE POST-INTELLIGENCER, THE TARIFF AND "VILLAGE LAWYERS"

THE Seattle Post-Intelligencer thinks there was gross incompetence in the preparation of the Underwood bill, and it assigns as a reason for the conclusion that nine of the fourteen majority members of the committee that fashioned the measure resided in towns of less than 13,000 inhabitants before they went to Congress.

"One comes from Sherman, Tex., a town of 12,412 inhabitants; one from Brunswick, Ga., a town of 10,182 inhabitants; one from Jefferson City, Mo., a town of 11,859 in habitants; one from Scotland Neck, N. C., with less than 2,500 inhabitants; one from Carrollton, Ill., less than 2,500 people; one from Mount Vernon, Ind., 2,915; one from Carthage, Tenn., a village of some 600; one from St. James, Minn., less than 2,500, and one from Stroudsburg, Pa., 4,379. These nine village lawyers constitute rather more than two-thirds of the committee which framed a measure which will directly affect every man employed in manufacturing and in commerce throughout the whole United States.

But why this aspersion upon "village lawyers?" If we are to infer that "village lawyers" are incompetent, perhaps the Post-Intelligencer will explain how the American Nation came to grow great, for, unfortunate as it might be, the keeping of the country has usually been in the hands of residents of villages.

Henry Clay, the author of protection as a principle, was a "village lawyer." So were Jackson, and Benton, and Calhoun, and Van Buren, and Hayne, and Polk, and Buchanan, and Walker, and Cass, and Corwin, and Fessenden, and Crittenden, and Tyler, and Pierce, and nearly all the other statesmen of the ante-bellum days, "village lawyers," every one of them.

Abraham Lincoln, the first Republican President, was 50 years of age before he had had experience outside of a village so small that some of those mentioned by the Post-Intelligencer seem like thriving metropolises in comparison.

The first Republican high-tariff bill was the "Morrill bill" named for a "village for lawyer," and it was found by the "Kelly," the "McKinley," the "Dingley" and the "Payne" bills, all high-tariff and all named for village inhabitants.

Beginning with Marshall and ending with Waite nearly all of the chief justices, and associate justices, too, for that matter, were "village lawyers."

But why go further? The same story would apply to nearly every line of endeavor in this country. The history of the United States is the story of achievement by village residents. Even Mr. Taylor, principal owner of the Post-Intelligencer, was a resident of Everett until a few months ago.

"Village lawyers," indeed! If that is the best the priests of high-tariff can do the Underwood bill will stand the test.
