GLEANINGS FROM GREAT NORTHERN EMPIRE

A sanatorium is being erected for the Indians at Bella Coola, North British Columbia.

Grocery proprietors of Prince Rupert have been accused of selling liquor without a license.

Four lots on Third avenue, Prince Rupert, sold a few days ago for \$1,000 a front foot. The sale netted the owner \$95,000.

Lord Osborne Beauclerc, heir to the English dukedom of St. Albans, was made a member of the Arctic Brotherhood at Wrangell last week.

The Moose lodge that was instituted at Wrangell recently started with 43 members. It was expected that there would be 50 more at the next meeting.

Valuable iron ore claims of Louise Island, Cumshewa Inlet, near Prince Rupert were sold recently to Henry K. Owen, of Seattle, for \$75,000. It is proposed to develop the property.

Wrangell will appropriately observe Decoration Day, May 30th. A mass meeting was called for the purpose of making arrangements for the celebration to be held Saturday night.

Prince Rupert merchants have inaugurated a half-holiday and hereafter the clerks and salesmen of that city will have a half-holiday each week. Thursday afternoons will belong to the employees.

The Grand Trunk British Columbia Coal Company is developing its coal mines 15 miles up Bulkley river from Prince Rupert and it expects to be in position to supply the demand for fuel and hard coal at Prince Rupert next winter.

The authorities of Prince Rupert have directed that the wreck of the Coronado on Digby Island be removed or destroyed. The Coronado let was towed to her position on Digby Island a few years ago, after being wrecked when on her way with a cargo of coal from the Sound to Alaska.

The largest drydock on the Pacific Coast is being built at Hays Cove, Prince Rupert. It will be large enough to dock any ship that floats on the Pacific Ocean. It is one of the largest undertakings now in progress on the Pacific Coast, and has the support of the Canadian admiralty. It is proposed to make Prince Rupert a naval base, according to the Prince Rupert Empire.
