 PHOENIX, ARIZ., May 7.—The State Senate yesterday defeated the bill making an appropriation for the San Francisco Panama-Pacific exposition. The bill was killed in the interest of economy.

4TH-CLASS POSTMASTERS MUST PASS EXAMS.
 WASHINGTON, May 8.—Postmaster-General A. S. Burleson announced yesterday afternoon that the fourth-class postmasters, that were placed in the classified service by former President William H. Taft shortly before his retirement from office, will have to submit to competitive examinations. Many thousands are involved in the announcement. It is believed that it will result in many resignations.

SCHOOL TO FIGHT WHITE SLAVERY STARTS
 WASHINGTON, May 8.—A school is being started in this city to train warriors against the white slave traffic. Stanley M. Finch, special commissioner of the department of justice, in charge of the white slave investigation, is the father of the school plan.
 Mr. Finch proposes that 100 names be enrolled before the school, which will be conducted on the lecture plan, has its actual beginning. Weekly meetings will be held and addresses made by Mr. Finch and others. Enrollment will be sought in various churches of the city. It is Mr. Finch's plan to have similar schools started in other cities.

TONY DORTERO DISPOSES OF THOSE FAMOUS PIGS
 Of the colony of pigs brought up on the last boat under the personal charge of Tony Dortero, Doctor Brown and gets three of them and J. J. Chambers will nurture two along to a fat old age. The remaining one Mr. Dortero will feed up for a while and then barbecue it for a forthcoming smoker to be given by the Arctic Brotherhood.

G. N. BEGINS BIG CONSTRUCTION WORK
 SEATTLE, May 8.—The Great Northern has begun extensive construction work in Montana and the Dakotas. It expects to expend \$30,000,000 in extending its lines in those three States. It will make room for thousands of settlers.

MOTION PICTURES BEING INTRODUCED IN SCHOOLS
 WASHINGTON, May 8.—Motion pictures are being introduced in the public schools of Washington. They are being utilized in history classes. Not only are historic sections of the world shown the children, but scenes of historic events as conceived by competent writers and acted by clever actors and actresses are being reproduced for them.

SENATOR VARDAMAN IS WITH CALIFORNIANS
 WASHINGTON, May 8.—The stand taken by the people of California regarding the alien law is "a declaration in favor of Anglo-Saxon supremacy," according to Senator Vardaman of Mississippi. Senator Vardaman declared that he would rather cut off all business intercourse with the entire Orient than sacrifice the interest of the white people of even one small section of the State of California.
 "Race purity is indispensable to Caucasian supremacy," he declared. "The only way to maintain that supremacy is to prohibit by law the comingling of the races."

MRS. WILSON WILL ATTEND CHILDREN'S BALL
 WASHINGTON, May 8.—Mrs. Woodrow Wilson and her daughters will attend the children's ball at the New Willard, May 24, the proceeds of which will go toward the relief of the children in the flood zone of the Middle West.

NO VOTES FOR ENGLISH WOMEN
 LONDON, May 7.—The British parliament defeated the bill enfranchising women last night by a majority of 47 votes. The bill has been pending for some time in the Commons but only came to a vote yesterday.

DENMARK DECIDES THAT ICELAND MUST GO DRY
 COPENHAGEN, May 8.—The Danish government has decreed that no more alcoholic liquor shall be imported into Iceland. The people there will be permitted to consume what liquor they have but they cannot have more when that is gone.

FORMER FILIPINO JUDGE FAVORS INDEPENDENCE
 WASHINGTON, May 8.—Judge W. F. Norris, for seven years a member of the Filipino bench but now of the State Department, favors independence for the Philippine islands, though he does not say that it should be granted immediately. He says the spirit of independence and liberty is helping in the work of making a homogeneous people capable of self-government, and he thinks the spirit should be encouraged rather than held back. He declared:
 "The United States is in the Philippines to begin the regeneration of Asia, and to furnish an example of the proper manner of treatment of a lesser people by a great Christian nation."

MOUNTAIN-CLIMBING PARSON COMING OUT
 Archdeacon Stuck, of the Episcopal church, who is heading an expedition to the summit of Mt. McKinley, expects to come out of the interior of Alaska early next autumn after five years of continuous service in there. He will spend October as delegate from Alaska to the general convention in New York. Immediately thereafter he will be ready to accept invitations to speak on behalf of the church's work in Alaska. The archdeacon will be supplied with the exceedingly attractive lantern slides and, in addition to his Sunday preaching, will deliver during the week illustrated lectures on the Alaska work.

U. S. MIGHT ACQUIRE WASHINGTON'S TOMB
 WASHINGTON, May 8.—Representative William J. Crary, Republican, of Wisconsin, expects to get action on his resolution providing for the acquisition by the government of Washington's tomb at Mt. Vernon. The resolution provides for an investigation as to the cost the Ladies' Association has been put to since it obtained control of the estate. The purpose then will be to reimburse it for its outlay, and to provide for the care of the tomb at government expense. The rules committee of the House has consented to place the resolution with other matters on the calendar to be considered as soon as the tariff bill is out of the way.

BROOD OF FIVE WELL AND WILL GROW UP
 LUZERNE, N. Y., May 8.—The five children born at one time to Mrs. Stiles Tinney at this place a month ago are alive and healthy and bid fair to grow up as their brothers and sisters have grown. Besides the five just born, Mrs. Tinney has given birth to three pairs of twins, and twice to triplets. They are all living. Mrs. Tinney is forty-two years of age and Mr. Tinney is forty-nine.

IT WILL BE DOCTOR LANE PRETTY SOON
 SAN FRANCISCO, May 8.—The University of California has voted to confer the degree of LL.D. upon Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane. It will date from May 14th, though the California cabinet member has notified the regents of the University that he cannot come West to have it conferred upon him at that time.

SAN FRANCISCO GAS WORKERS GO ON STRIKE
 SAN FRANCISCO, May 8.—Three thousand Pacific Gas and Electric Company employees went out on a strike yesterday. They ask for better pay, an other conditions more favorable to the workmen.
