 TO IMPROVE CEMETERY**
 DOUGLAS, June 10.—At the last meeting of the Douglas Island Civic Improvement Club the question of fencing the cemetery came up for discussion and a committee, consisting of Mesdames Roberts, Richards, Hile, McCormick and Feusi, and Messrs. Hopp, Gatwas, Gillie, John Hensen and Varnaman, was appointed to visit the cemetery with the object of determining the possibilities there, and the cost of fencing.
 The results will be reported at a special meeting of the club Wednesday, June 11th, 1913, at the school-house.
 The fencing of the cemetery is the one big thing that the club has undertaken to do this year and should receive the support of every citizen, as well-kept cemeteries are significant of higher civilization.
 At an early meeting of the club this year an amount of \$50.00 was subscribed as a beginning of the cemetery fund, to which individual donations may be added. These donations can be left with John Hensen at his office. The Civic Club hopes to add substantially to the original subscription by money raised from a few good entertainments to be given in the near future.
 The club has also decided to take up the three different lines of work and every one interested in civic affairs, literary work, or child's welfare work is requested to be present at the Wednesday evening meeting.
 There is much work to be done in all of these lines, particularly in the Child Welfare League. It should meet with unlimited interest as it will embrace so much. Its principal object should be the bringing about of a better condition of affairs, regarding playgrounds, gymnasiums, etc.

**CITY FATHERS
 EQUALIZING TAXES**

The City Council met last night for the purpose of checking up on the complaints that had been made as to the assessment rolls for the city of Juneau, and made a few alterations reducing the total assessments approximately a little over six thousand dollars. The reductions were insignificant as compared with the total assessment of over two millions of dollars. There were no advances in any case.
 The reductions made were to Chas. Goldstein, \$400; John Olds, \$1,000; Mrs. Lillian Irwin, (on property outside of city), \$1,500; James McKenna, \$250; J. H. Cobb, \$400; J. B. Caro, \$2,500. Total, \$6,050.

This includes all the taxable property within the city, both personal and real.

**VICTOR VON ARX SUES
 CITY OF DOUGLAS**

A mandatory injunction is sought together with damages to the amount of \$500.

**EAKIN GOES TO
 KOYUKUK AND YUKON**

Henry M. Eakin, who has been one of the government geologists employed for the past several years in Alaska, passed through on the Mariposa enroute to the interior where he will continue the surveys in the Yukon-Koyukuk region. Mr. Eakin will put in the entire season at that locality. He will work from Fort Hamlin, on the Yukon, to Hughes, on the Koyukuk, covering that particular section formerly known as the Red Mountain district but now known as the Indian River district. He will then travel across country to Ruby.

Speaking of the Juneau outlook, Mr. Eakin said that this town was destined to be a great mining city. The geological department has a very high opinion of the Juneau section. Mr. Eakin also said that he had seen some very fine specimens from the Skagway section and other Lynn canal points. He thinks that all Alaska is due for greater activity than ever and that an era of real prosperity is coming.

**OLD-TIMER AGAIN
 IN CAPITAL CITY**

Wes Matlock arrived in Juneau last night on the Mariposa and will remain here a few days. Mr. Matlock did not haul the gravel that forms Chicken Ridge (now known as Gastineau Heights) but he was here a long time ago. In 1897 Mr. Matlock bought the old log church and converted the property into a brewery in 1898. However, the placer fever was running high in 1899 and he became infected and sailed for Nome.

The Seward peninsula metropolis has been his habitat ever since those exciting days and he is now engaged in dredge mining on Solomon river. He is now enroute to his mining interests, but will tarry a few days in Juneau. Speaking of the town last night he said that he was glad to see the evidences of prosperity that were visible at the present time and expressed the opinion that the people here could not fully appreciate the greatness to which Juneau is destined.
