DEMAND FOR COMPILED STATUTES IS GREAT

The demand for the "compiled laws of the Territory of Alaska, 1913," commonly called the new code, compiled by the committee on territories of the National House of Representatives, are in such demand that the offices of Gov. J. F. A. Strong and Secretary W. L. Dustin have been flooded with inquiries as to how to get the compilation. So numerous have become the inquiries that this morning W. W. Shorthill, secretary to the Governor, gave out the following statement:
 "Copies of the 'Compiled Laws of the Territory of Alaska, 1913,' in one volume, bound in buckram, may be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C., upon payment of \$1.50 per copy. Remittances should be made only in the form of postoffice money order, express order, or New York draft. This compilation is the one authorized by the act of Congress of Aug. 24, 1912, and the work was done under the direction of the joint committee on territories of the Senate and House of Representatives. The laws are compiled, codified, arranged and annotated in a most careful and thorough manner, and the volume is in great demand by members of the legal profession as well as many others. The act referred to provided that 1,500 copies of the compilation should be furnished to members of the United States Senate and 2,500 copies to members of the House of Representatives—approximately five copies to each member of Congress. These are, of course, distributed free of charge while they last. The index to the volume is alone worth the cost of the book, being very elaborate and complete."
