GREAT, GREATER AND GREATEST OF ALL

Greatest Northwest belongs most appropriately to the Territory of Alaska. Greater Northwest is a term used for the first time to designate the section of the United States covered by Montana, Idaho, Oregon and Washington. Great Northwest is the expression used by a number of middle west publications to include Illinois, Iowa, North and South Dakota, the section which is sometimes spoken of as the upper Mississippi valley.
 The area covered by Alaska is 586,400 square miles; that of the Greater Northwest 396,090 square miles, and that of the Great Northwest 344,485 square miles. The Greatest Northwest is once and one-half again larger than either of the other sections.
 Seeing that the Mississippi-valley people have appropriated the term "Northwest" unto themselves and for many of their organizations, it would be futile to attempt to relieve them of it. The use of Greatest Northwest will serve to put one over on them—and no one will object, seeing that Alaska turned in some \$17,000,000 of gold and more than \$18,000,000 of sea foods and furs last year to the channels of commerce in this section, to accord it her with the superlative.—Cordova Alaskan.

REMAINS OF JAMES TRAVERS DISCOVERED

VALDEZ, June 20.—The Valdez Prospector says:
 "Dr. T. A. Haxby, who came to Valdez on the last boat from LaTouche, reports the finding by the searching party headed by himself of the bones of James Travers, who left more than two months ago from the "Madhouse" to go to Montague island, but was never seen afterward.
 "After the missing man had not been heard of nor seen for six weeks a searching party went to look for him, as he had left with only ten days' provisions. They found his boat on the rocks at Dangerous Point on the east side of LaTouche island, where the beach is exposed to the heavy swells of the ocean. After a diligent search they found a sack of food and later found bones of the unfortunate man scattered along the beach for 200 feet. Many bones were not removed, as the sea weed is more than a foot thick and the men were unable to find them. The skull was found but the entire front part of it had been broken away and was gone.
 "When Travers left the "Madhouse" he had \$600 on his person, but not a cent was found in his clothing which the searchers found on the beach.
 "It is supposed that when he reached the outside of the island on his way to Montague he anchored the boat and went to sleep, as he had made a bed in a small dory he had borrowed from John Wilds. During the night the

wind may have freshened and have blown him on the shore, which at high tide is a fine gravel beach and at low tide is covered with big jagged rocks, upon which the boat must have been wrecked and he drowned, washed ashore and pounded to pieces, or else devoured by the ravens and gulls. The bones were picked clean, according to Dr. Huxby.
