OPPOSE ANTI-STREET SPEAKING ORDINANCE
 The Juneau local of the Socialist party Tuesday evening took strong ground against the enforcement of the anti-street speaking ordinance, and adopted the following address, which The Empire has been requested to publish:
 "While the Socialist party has no connection with the I. W. W., and has had nothing to do with the battle for free speech now being waged by that organization in the streets of Juneau, it is unwilling that the public should be allowed to believe that it approves the ill considered course of the Juneau city council, or that it could fail to sympathize with any honest endeavor to protect a fundamental human right, to whomsoever it might be denied.
 "The city council of Juneau, in denying a right exercised by Socrates in the streets of Athens, and by Jesus Christ in all the cities of the holy land, and by other agitators in untold numbers in every age, has emulated the courage and the sagacity of a yearling bull who confidently attempts to toss a locomotive from its track.
 "The city council of Juneau is seemingly indifferent to the fact that the city of Seattle tried for two years to suppress free speech in that city, and was then so well convinced of the hopelessness of the task that when Judge Humphries tried it again last summer, he succeeded only in convincing a far reaching public that it was a hopeless failure. The Juneau city council is seemingly indifferent to the fact that the city council of Spokane, after spending thousands of dollars in the attempt to abridge the freedom of speech in that city, finally gave up in ignominious defeat. The city council of Juneau perhaps does not know that except in such cases as that at Boston, where Garrison was dragged through the streets by a lawless mob, and at San Diego, where potential murderers lawlessly and tyrannically drove law-abiding citizens from the town, have city councils succeeded in accomplishing the desire with which the Juneau city council is imbued, and it may not have been realized by the Juneau city council that the outrages committed at San Diego cannot be repeated here, for the reason that the National administration would be forced to bear the odium.
 "The course of the Juneau city council is the more remarkable because it has been without adequate cause. There was, when the city council placed this chip on the municipal shoulder, no probability of any considerable organization of the I. W. W., and it is not probable now, except for the attitude maintained by the city council toward them at this time. The fact that an occasional blanket stiff with an I. W. W. button on his coat has been seen within the city limits offers no sufficient reason for such overwhelming terror even on the part of the employers of labor and their representatives, as ought to have been necessary to impel a city council to deny a human right universally recognized since the dawn of civilization.
 "The action of the local authorities has, as a matter of fact, had the effect of rousing a sympathy which otherwise might have been denied them. The action of the city council practically says in effect that the working men of the community have not sufficient intelligence to determine whether the ideas of the I. W. W. were good or bad for them, and there is always
