**CHINA JOE HOLDS OPEN HOUSE NOW**  
 China Joe, one of Juneau's oldest inhabitants is receiving in honor of the beginning of a new year in China. This has been a fixed habit with China Joe, and for more than thirty years he has had the latch string out in his Juneau home, and has welcomed old and young on this annual occasion. He has rich candies and fruits from the Flowery Empire for women and children, and serves something cheering to male adults, but what is still more gratifying he gives the smile of loyal friendship to all.  
 Always friendly to the whites and kind to the needy, China Joe endeared himself to the early pioneers. In one particular instance he won their lasting friendship. He had a monopoly of flour during one winter when boats were many months apart, and instead of realizing a handsome profit as many white merchants have since been known to do in the Northland, he kept the price of bread the same. Later when the great Chinese exodus from the Pacific Coast set in, during 1885, Joe was allowed to remain, while all the other Chinese, employees of Treadwell, were driven from the mines and forced to leave the country.  
 China Joe is said to have come to Alaska first in 1874, touching at Wrangell, while following the great gold rush to the Cassiar country. Three years later he returned to Wrangell and still later went to Sitka. In 1881 he was caught with the gold fever and followed the rush to Silver Bow basin, at which time the strike was made on Gold creek and the town of Juneau was formed. Arriving here he established himself on the identical spot which has continued to be his home.  
 Still clinging to his little place at Main and Third streets, China Joe lives, and continues in his unobtrusive way to cultivate the little garden created on the plot of ground surrounding his house way back in 1881. Unabashed by the changes and mutations of time he continues his peaceful existence. If he is surprised at the wonderful growth of Juneau he gives no evidence of it. During all these years he has maintained his small garden on the lot occupied in part by his house and has busied himself at other work betimes. If the years
