CLEANINGS OF GREAT NORTHERN EMPIRE
 The report of the receiver of the Fairbanks Banking company, Capt. Barnette's bank, showed a balance on hand of \$51,084.33. Much of this sum, however, is held to pay dividends already allowed by the court to persons where the money has been garnished or where there is dispute as to whom it should be paid.

M. E. Lane, the Myers Chuck, Ketchikan district, salmon salter, has sold his saltery at Myers Chuck, and will build a salting station at Kendrick Arm.

None has an indoor baseball league, and the contest for the pennant is becoming one of absorbing interest in the Seward peninsula metropolises.

There are 116 pupils enrolled in the Nome public school.

Late reports received at Fairbanks indicate that the Tanana Crossing country will develop into a good placer camp. It is said that the results obtained by those doing assessment work last fall were very favorable. There are 25 new cabins in the districts, and a good deal of work is planned for next year.

J. L. Timmins, who passed through Juneau last week on his way to the States, goes to secure funds and experts to establish a large hydro-electric plant for the Tanana valley, according to Fairbanks papers. It is proposed to establish the power plant in the Totatlanika.

J. F. Halloran and Homer Leonard, of Fairbanks, were apprehended at Shushanna Junction and taken back to Fairbanks early this month to answer a charge of stealing a dog. The complaint was sworn to by Joe Enos, of Fairbanks.

Coming to Fairbanks from the Totatlanika for the first time in more than a year John J. Murphy, of Murphy Brothers and Cook, operators in that country, caused a warrant to issue for the arrest of J. P. Sherman for the alleged crime of shooting at Murphy. At the time of the shooting it was said that Sherman mistook Murphy for a caribou. Murphy had different ideas about the incident, and, evidently, has not forgotten them.

A petition has been circulated at Tanana Crossing asking for the establishment of a postoffice at that place.

Prospectors in the Girchell creek country believe they have struck a coming mining district according to J. W. McCord, of Fairbanks, who recently visited the creek. Girchell creek is a tributary of Johnson river.

The indigent fund for the Third Judicial Division has been exhausted and the court is powerless to aid helpless natives in that section of Alaska.

A destitute prospector who was so badly frozen that he had lost consciousness was found in a cabin two miles distant from Chitina recently. He was sent to Cordova to the hospital there.

The Valdez Prospector says reports received at Valdez are that the road from that place to Fairbanks is all open and in fine condition for travel.

It is proposed to seed the Valdez dyke to grass. It is thought that a sward will assist in preventing the embankment from washing away.

Ketchikan bait dealers report having difficulty in securing bait to sell to the fishermen.

For the first time in its history the Holy Cross hospital at Nome was without patients for a time this winter.

The application for the consolidation of the town of Valdez and the Reservation, the largest suburb of the town, will be heard by Judge Fred M. Brown at Valdez February 18th.
