COMMERCIAL MEN ARE OPTIMISTIC

"Conditions were never so good at bottom as now," said J. F. Chamberlin, the well known commercial man, who arrived in Juneau on the last Mariposa after an extensive visit in the States. "The prosperity that is coming now," he said, "is resting on a sound foundation. Everybody realizes it and in the past few weeks there has been a marked evidence of it in every line. During nineteen days of January last one of the largest establishments in Seattle did more business than during the whole of January last year and last year was not so bad."

"The passage of the new currency law had much to do with it. During the discussion of this bill in Congress a course of lectures on the plan was delivered in Seattle and these lectures were given earnest attention by Seattle business men with the result that everyone is very familiar with the advantages that are to be reaped through its operation. Under the new law money will be available to carry on legitimate enterprises and people will put their capital at work confident that it will not be lost."

"There will be a large expansion of business and a great industrial development inaugurated almost immediately, without any wildcatting feature. The relations of the banks of the country to the reserve banks is such that there is no incentive to over-speculation and yet security and assistance to legitimate business. Confidence has been restored."

"In coast cities much thought is centered on Alaska. With the passage of the railroad bill and the opening up of the coal mines, Alaska is certain to be the scene of a great development and the population will increase rapidly."
