\$100,000 PAID TODAY FROM
 PAYROLL OF \$145,000

TREADWELL, April 16.—Today is payday for the Treadwell company, and by nightfall approximately one hundred thousand dollars will have been distributed to workmen on the island, which in turn will find its way into the various avenues of business. Many of the workmen are constructing homes here, while many others draw only so much of their salaries as their necessities require, leaving large balances with the company. Out of a total payroll this month of \$145,000, about \$45,000 will be taken care of by the company for the wage earners who desire to save.
