**MAKING IT HARD ON MISSIONARIES**

A peculiar case has just ended in Juneau. One of Archdeacon Stuck's "low-down whites" sold an Indian whiskey, and was arrested therefor. The whiskey seller was acquitted upon the grounds that under statutes the Indian is a citizen of the United States.

The citizenship of this Indian was established by the fact that he claims no tribal rights in Alaska and can read and write and answer the principal questions and must be answered by a foreigner to obtain citizenship in the United States. He told the court that George Washington was the first president of the United States that Theodore Roosevelt had been president; that Woodrow Wilson is now president, and that William H. Taft preceded Wilson in the presidency. He admitted that he reads newspapers and magazines, can walk and two-step, but that he cannot dance the Tango. The jury decided that any Indian who could "do" that strong was a citizen of the United States.
