**MAURICE LEEHEY NOT INTERESTED IN ROUTES**

A letter received from Maurice D. Leehey, the well known mining lawyer of Seattle, who has an extensive Alaska law practice, and who was attorney for the original Chisana locators who won their suits recently at Cordova, says he is not interested in any particular route for Alaska's railroad.

Several days ago it was published in various Alaska newspapers that Mr. Leehey had purchased 15 town lots at Seward and that he believed that the Alaska railroad would be built from that place.

Mr. Leehey, writing under date of April 21 from Seattle, says:  
To the Editor:—In a recent issue you mentioned my purchase of town lots at Seward, and added that I believe Seward "will be the terminus of the railroad to the Alaska interior." I am not vain enough to suppose that anyone cares what I believe on that subject. But I fear the statement may cause some people to misconstrue my activity in behalf of Alaska railway legislation, and perhaps also that of my associates in the Alaska Bureau with whom I spent some months in Washington doing what little we could to secure the early passage of the bill. I hope nobody will believe I had or have any special interest, whatever in any particular route, or any interest other than the general benefits of Alaska developments.

The lots mentioned were really deeded me in trust to carry out a contract by which a law suit was settled. It was only natural that your Seward correspondent should assume it to be a purchase, based on such belief, but I have no information and have taken no interest in the discussion of the merits of different routes.

**JACKLING PROPERTY SHOWS BIG GAINS**

The Boston News Bureau, one of the leading financial papers of the country, commenting upon the showing for March and indications for April for the Utah Copper company, one of Col. D. C. Jackling's properties, says:

"Preliminary figures indicate that for the month of March the Utah Copper Co. registered a new high record output at 12,700,000 pounds. This is almost 1,000,000 pounds larger than any previous month and is at the rate of over 150,000,000 pounds per annum. It goes without saying that this production is vastly in excess of the output shown by any single mining operation in the world.

"The company is now beginning to reap the benefits of the advance in the stripping work, and it is more than likely that the present month of April will also record a very large output.
