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ADLAI EWING STEVENSON.

A WELL MADE POINT.

ADLAI EWING STEVENSON, who died at Chicago Saturday, was a man who had been more selfish or ambitious for high position, would have gone far in politics. He was a true gentleman of the old school with a nature the most kindly and gentle, a ripe scholar, an able lawyer and a fine public speaker. He made friends of all whom he met, and he held friends once made with "hooks of steel." Though well-to-do and of a well-to-do ancestry through both the Stevenson and the Ewing lines, with rich kinsfolk and associates, he was always in theory and practice a friend of the masses. He was as if made for popularity and campaigning, yet, notwithstanding an intense interest in politics, he never sought office. He was nominated for Congress while on the floor of the convention protesting that others were more deserving and better qualified. He accepted a near Cabinet position because he was told that acceptance would heal dissensions in and strengthen his party in his State, and he was a Democrat who loved the democracy that was contained in his party. He ran for Vice-President the last time because he was persuaded that he could help Bryan, whom he admired and believed in, and he made an unsuccessful race for Governor of Illinois, his last political appearance, because he desired to harmonize the Illinois Democracy. We cannot wish more than that his eternal sleep may be as peaceful as his life on earth was sweet and beneficent.

J. A. HELLENTHAL, in the course of his speech at Elks' hall Saturday night, speaking of the Roosevelt-Pinchot-Taft conservation methods and policies, made the well taken point that we cannot conserve the lumber supply by placing large tracts of trees in reservations. That, he said, would not reduce the use of lumber. It would give those who have timber tracts that are on the market a monopoly of the demand, and increase lumber cost to the consumers, but in the end timber cannot be conserved without the curtailment of lumber consumption. He applied the same reasoning to the coal lands. The bottling up of Alaska's coal deposits could not serve to save the general coal supply for future generations unless the people diminished the use of coal in their ships and factories and homes. It could only serve to give those who have available coal a monopoly of the market and permit them to charge more for it.

One man controlled the New Haven. One man therefore, directed it to its downfall. But the other directors, who stood by as dummies and approved because they did not dare to disapprove, cannot dodge their equal responsibility in pleas of cowardice and thick-headedness.

Of course the Colonel is the only man upon whom the opposition to President Wilson could unite. He would not permit a union upon any other person.

CALL FOR DEMOCRATIC TERRITORIAL CONVENTION

A Democratic Territorial convention is hereby called to convene at Skagway, Alaska, on Monday, August 3rd, 1914, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of said day, for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Delegate to Congress and elect nine members of the next Territorial committee and transacting such other business as may properly come before said convention.

Under the rules adopted at the last Democratic convention, each division is entitled to fifty delegates, the same to be apportioned among the precincts of said division by the Territorial committee of said division. In each division Delegates shall be elected in such manner as the Territorial committee for that division shall determine; provided, however, that in the incorporated towns the Delegates shall be chosen at the primary election under such rules and regulations as said committee shall prescribe.
