THE CELEBRATION.

IF EVERYBODY on Gastineau channel or within reach of it does not give full expression to his patriotism Saturday it will be his own fault or misfortune. It will not be because the committees in charge of the proposed celebrations at Juneau and on Douglas Island have not done good work. The plans for a more elaborate display of the National colors and for a larger list of prizes for athletic and aquatic sports than ever before witnessed at one time in this section of Alaska have been completed, and the men in charge of things constitute a guarantee that everything will work out as planned.

FLYING ACROSS THE OCEAN.

THE plans being perfected by Glenn H. Curtiss, L. Rodman Wanamaker and Lieut. John Cyril Porte to put a flying machine across the Atlantic are the most elaborate and most carefully prepared, apparent-

ly, of any that have been made for aeroplane experiments since the practicability of air navigation was first demonstrated by the Wright brothers. The cost of the expedition will be far greater than the \$50,000 prize for which they are contending. In fact, it is said that Mr. Wanamaker expects that he will be out more than twice that amount before the collection can be made from the London Mall.

But more propitious than the elaborate preparations for the proposed expedition is the confidence of everybody connected with it that only success awaits the completion of their efforts. Mr. Curtiss, who has personally supervised the building of the America, and under whose direction the try-outs have been conducted, Mr. Wanamaker, who is furnishing the money, and Lieut. Porte, the young English naval officer who will pilot the airship, are enthused with the project, and can see only accomplished achievement in the end.

If the splendid effort of these men are putting forth shall result in the expected success, another chapter in the final story of air navigation will have been entered.
