THE Socialist organ charges that the Juneau Democratic club is in the hands of "machine men" who are not Democrats. In proof of the charge it says a majority of the club voted against men for delegates whom it regards as more popular than some of those who were elected, and it points to the circumstance that

It voted down proposed platform declarations in favor of government loans to homesteaders and in favor of the election of the Territorial treasurer and the Territorial mining inspector.

Yet, that same club meeting declared in favor of a full measure of self-government for Alaska and for the direct primary election law. It urged government of Alaska by the people of Alaska rather than through those who have influence with bureaus at Washington. It stood strongly and firmly for a policy that would give the people of this Territory an opportunity to legislate for themselves and the means with which to take charge of political organizations and thus destroy "machines." These are the important democratic principles and policies that are involved in the present campaign in Alaska.

The question of lending money to homesteaders with which to improve their claims is National in its scope, and a declaration in its favor could accomplish no purpose in Alaska other than to burden a platform. So far as this Territory is concerned at this time it is simply an abstract proposition. The decision against the election of ministerial and technical officers who cannot shape policies of government was a decision in favor of the shorter ballot urged by President Wilson and progressives everywhere.
