One of the first acts of the Alaska legislature should have been a law, directed against this form of depredation, making the penalty so severe that the fear of discovery would hold some of the evildoers in check. —Douglas News.

SPECIAL SESSION FOR DELINQUENTS

The city council held a special session last night for the purpose of taking action toward the collection of delinquent personal taxes. The amount unpaid is not large and the roll of delinquents was ordered published in the Alaska Daily Empire. The tax must be paid before September 24. All members of the council were present except Geddes.

Discuss Finance.
Chairman J. R. Willis proposed a finance plan which was adopted. The plan in brief is to have the citizens of Juneau carry warrants that may in future be issued when there are no funds with which to pay the same. These warrants will be allowed to draw interest at 8 per cent until called. They are to be issued in amounts of not less than \$1000 and only to meet actual current expenses. The banks, it was asserted, will loan money up to a certain sum on notes with responsible endorsers.

The council in addition to taking up old debts of the city, has paid out approximately \$25,000 this year in street improvements. It requires about \$1,500 per month to run the city in addition to the expenses of the public schools including teachers' salaries.

The general discussion that followed developed that the city was in no immediate want, in fact was in pretty good shape, but it was believed that precautionary steps should be taken toward providing for the future. Several citizens have assured members of the council that they are willing to loan the city money on these warrants that it is proposed to issue.

Routine Matters.
A number of bills were audited and ordered paid.

A proposal from R. W. Wulzen and others for the improvement of Seventh street between Gold and Main streets was agreed to. The proposition is for the city and abutting property to divide the cost.

A petition for the improvement of Gold street between Fifth and Sixth was referred. An application for the appointment of health officers was referred.

The plan of laying in a supply of coal was discussed.

qualifications are subject to only one year's active service in time of peace in military forces.

Russia.
The Russian army employs the corps formation, and numbers 25 corps consisting each of two divisions of infantry, three brigades of artillery, one division of cavalry, and one section of horse artillery. The infantry division numbers 18,000 men, the cavalry division 4,000 men, a battalion, 1,000 men.

The age of military service is between 21 and 43 years, teachers, doctors, and Christian clergy being excepted. In the Cossack army liability begins at the end of the 18th year. The army is recruited by conscription in accordance with the laws of 1874, 1876, 1888 and 1893.

TIRLEMONT IS TOWN OF HISTORIC INTEREST

As the German host swings northward comes again in line of strife the historic spot of Tirlemont where the deserter Dumouriez made his last great stand as leader of the French in 1793 when he put the Austrians to rout. Today the city stands with its walls dismantled, at the edge of an extensive forest, two hundred feet above the river Geete. It has long been the favorite summer resort of pleasure-loving Parisians. The Castle of Tirlemont, now serving as a barracks and military prison, was in 1370 the seat of Charles V and among others of its interesting associations may be listed the facts that it was the birthplace of Charles IX, of Margaret of Navarre, of Henry II and Louis XIV. James II of England and most of his family lived and died there in exile.

A STRUCTURE OF SUBSTANTIAL PLANKS

The Democratic Territorial convention at Skagway had proper appreciation of the great work done for Alaska by the present national administration, and pays a deserved tribute to the splendid efforts of President Wilson and his immediate family. In addition the platform declares for many needed reforms in this Territory and for measures that would tend to the betterment of conditions and the development of Alaska. Then too there is a declaration for the primary election law and the Australian ballot. These are progressive measures that must come in time and sentiment should be so exerted as to bring them quickly. The regulation of the fisheries is another matter that is urged, also the giving of full Territorial powers to Alaska. In fact the platform is filled with substantial planks upon which a great country could successfully be built and a Democracy established that would endure for generations.—Cordova Alaskan.

FRANK ALDRICH HEADS PIONEERS OF ALASKA

Among those chosen as officers for the ensuing term by the Grand Igloo of the Pioneers of Alaska were several local men. Frank Aldrich, who has been chosen as the Grand President, is an old time Nomeite who has spent 21 years in the North. To hold the position of Grand President it is necessary that the candidate shall have held all the important positions positions in the local Igloo first and then all the intermediate positions in the Grand Lodge. Mr. Aldrich who now heads the Pioneers of this Territory has spent but few weeks on the Outside in all of his long residence here. He is a charter member of the Nome Mine Workers Union, in good standing at the present time, a member of the Moose, and was one of the four representatives at the first Territorial legislature from this district.—Nome Industrial Worker.
