DRY STRAIT IMPROVEMENT BILL BEFORE CONGRESS

Delegate James Wickersham introduced a bill before the National House of Representatives July 30 appropriating \$25,000 for a preliminary survey of the often proposed improvement of Dry Strait near Wrangell. The proposed improvement has been suggested for the purpose of making shorter the route for steamers on the inside passage, and avoiding Wrangell Narrows.

The bill introduced by Delegate Wickersham provides: "That the sum of \$25,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be expended by and under the direction of the Secretary of War, for the survey of Dry Straits between Mitkof Island and Dry Island, near the mouth of the Stikine River, in the Territory of Alaska, to determine the cost of deepening the channel of said Dry Straits to a uniform width and depth sufficient for the navigation of the same by large vessels, and when the said surveys are made and estimates prepared the Secretary of War shall make a report thereof to Congress with recommendations."

NEW PASTOR FOR KETCHIKAN CATHOLICS

Father Mahoney, who has been in charge of the Catholic Churches at this place and Wrangell for the past several months, left for the south on the Dolphin yesterday on his way to Montana, where he will be stationed. Father George Bailey, recently of Spokane, is temporarily in charge of the work here until the arrival of Father Kern, who is looked for in about two weeks, and who will be the permanent priest. — Ketchikan Miner.

CABINET AGREES ON PANAMA OPENING

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—Subject to changes, the official program for the opening of the Panama canal in February, as it has been agreed upon by the Secretaries of State, War, and Navy, is:

Feb. 10-15, 1915—Foreign ships rendezvous at Hampton Roads.

Feb. 20—Foreign naval representatives received by the President in Washington.

Feb. 22—The President at Hampton Roads reviews the combined fleet, after which the fleet proceeds to Panama.

March 5—The President on a battleship departs for the canal.

March 10—The President arrives at Colon.

March 12—The President and fleet pass through the canal.

March 13—Ceremonies at Balboa or Panama.

March 13—The President sails for San Francisco on a battleship.

March 14—The fleet leaves Balboa for San Francisco.

March 23—The President arrives at San Francisco.

ROOSEVELT PLEDGES DOUBTFUL SUPPORT

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—After long silence Cbl. Theodore Roosevelt gave the administration qualified support in the crises resulting from war in Europe. He said:

"I regret that the policies which I believed to be essential for the welfare, the honor and greatness of the American people have not been more faithfully carried out. But that is passed in this crisis. At the moment the United States faces a crisis which has involved in war all the great nations of the world.

"We have our troubles here, but let us be thankful that we are citizens of this Republic, and that our burdens, though far lighter than those that must be borne by the men and women who live in other countries. I for one will act throughout this crisis as an American citizen, and will work hand in hand with any public servant with any kind and all private citizens who in good faith do all that is possible to see that the United States comes through unharmed and so conducts herself as to conserve the honor and the interests of her own citizens."

POLICE CATCH GOLD THIEF SUSPECT

WRANGELL, Aug. 14.—R. M. DeFosset, the man who is accused of stealing \$4000 in gold from the pack train while enroute from Dease Lake to Telegraph, arrived down on the Karen the first of the week, in charge of Special Deputy Wm. McNaul, of Telegraph. Marshal McNaul states that DeFosset was captured about 25 miles from Telegraph after a three day hunt and surrendered without any trouble, taking his captors back to Caribou Camp and showing them where he had hidden the gold in the brush a short distance from the trail. Marshal McNaul is taking his prisoner to Prince Rupert, where he will be tried.

R. M. DeFosset is a Frenchman about 28 years of age, and came to the Dease Lake country from the Hazelton district about three years ago during the Silver Creek stampede.

THROUGH TRAINS FOR PRINCE RUPERT SOON

PRINCE RUPERT, Aug. 17.—It is a welcome relief to turn from thoughts of war to a consideration of the early opening of the G. T. P. The railway, it is believed, will be doing business from Prince Rupert east not later than this month. In fact, only a few days intervene between now the three-week service from Prince Rupert to Winnipeg.

INSANE PATIENTS DIE AT MORNINGSIDES

The Governor's office has been notified of the death of Samuel Steinke on August 15th at Morningside Sanitarium, Portland, Oregon. Steinke was committed to the Sanitarium from Fort Gibbon in 1908.

The death of Miss Eleanor C. McDonald is also reported on August 7th. Miss McDonald was committed to the Sanitarium from Valdez, November 25th, 1910.
