DEER SEASON NOW OPEN EXCEPT ON RESERVES

The deer season opened Saturday and persons may now kill deer anywhere in Alaska under regulations prescribed except on the reserves until the season closes November 1. The regulations provide that one person may kill only six deer during the entire season; also that it is unlawful to sell the carcass of deer.

Deer reservations where it is unlawful to kill deer at any time are situated on the following islands in Alaska: Duke Island near Dixon Inlet; Gravina Island near Ketchikan; Krusenow Island, west of Sitka; Suezem Island, and near Klavack; and Zarembo Island near Wrangell.

DOUGLAS, Aug. 17.—James Robinson, one of the best known and most beloved of the pioneers on the Island, passed away this morning at his home on the beach.

Mr. Robinson was a native of Knockagolas, Monahan County, Ireland. He was ninety-five years of age and had been a resident of the Island for a number of years. Mr. Robinson was a member of the Loyal Orange Association, but so far as is known was not affiliated with any other order.

He is survived by two sons, William and James, who both reside on the Island; and three daughters, Mrs. James McAllister, of Seattle; Mrs. Agnes Ferguson, of Lowell, Wash., and Mrs. J. C. Kleck, of Orcas, Wash.

The funeral will take place from the undertaking parlors of H. V. Sully at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.
