MORE TRADE AND MORE CONFIDENCE

NEW YORK, Aug. 29. — Evidence that there has been a resumption of international trade relations on a moderate scale was afforded yesterday by the increased activity in the foreign exchange market at rates more nearly approaching the normal.

While the bankers have by no means solved the pressing problems arising from the war situation, the conditions have been gradually clearing and a spirit of confidence if not of optimism, is rapidly developing.

The situation had so far improved in the investment markets yesterday that the opinion was expressed in some quarters that the Stock Exchange might be able to open the first week in September, but some of the governors said the matter had not been discussed and would not be until the bankers were prepared to give an assurance that the reopening of the trading facilities of the institution would not cause the slightest embarrassment to the banking position.

Indeed, the suspension has given the commission houses an opportunity to strengthen themselves and eliminate undesirable features in their accounts.

The New York banking situation is now so strong that leading New York banks have begun to ship large amounts of emergency currency to the crop-raising sections of the South and West.—New York World.

EARLY SHIPMENT NEW FUEL EXPECTED

C. J. Wilbur, Jr., Alaska manager of the coal department of the Pacific Coast company, is expecting an early shipment of the company's new fuel product known as briquets and manufactured at the plant recently completed near Seattle at a cost of \$250,000.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer of August 23 contains a description of the new industrial plant at Bricketville just out from Seattle and in the Renton district. The new plant was inspected by members of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce last week, and is considered one of the most important industries in Seattle.

Four major processes are said to attend the treatment of the coal that enters into the composition of the briquets—the grinding of the coal to the right size; the drying out of all moisture; the thorough mixing of the coal and binder; and finally stamping the mixture into briquet shape.

The briquet is said to be odorless, smooth, dust free, and as valuable for heating purposes as the finest grade of hard coal. The manufacturers claim that it is manufactured under a new process that has overcome all of the objections that were found in other coal briquets.

SEATTLE ASKS FOR COAL LEASING LAW

SEATTLE, Aug. 25.—A resolution was introduced at the weekly meeting of the Seattle Commercial Club last night insisting upon the immediate opening of the Bering river coal fields in Alaska to prevent industrial paralysis and great hardships in the North and injury to the Pacific coast in case a war crisis should prevent the importation of coal from Canada.

Shortage May Come. The resolution, in addition to pointing out that Alaska mining operations were already suffering as a result of an insufficient amount of coal, recited that as coal used by the navy on the Pacific was brought from the Atlantic seaboard for the most part in foreign vessels, a shortage will soon exist at the government stations because foreign bottoms are not available to transport fuel to waters on this side of the ocean.

Commercial Club Acts Also.

SEATTLE, Aug. 26.—The opening of the Bering River coal fields of Alaska was urged last night in a resolution introduced at the weekly meeting of the Seattle Commercial Club and referred to the national affairs committee.

The resolution raised the question that coal shipments from Canada to Alaska might be suspended because of the war. This would cause the people of Alaska great hardship, it was pointed out. It was said that Alaska mining operations already have suffered from a coal shortage.

The Cordova Commercial Club is co-operating with the Seattle organization in an effort to open the natural resources of the North.

HEARST DECLARES HE IS NOT CANDIDATE

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—William R. Hearst declared again yesterday that he is not a candidate for United States Senator, and suggested that Judge James W. Gerard, present American Ambassador to Germany, be selected as the Democratic nominee.

Charles F. Murphy suggested Judge Gerard as the candidate last week, but the Tammany district leaders were then for Hearst.

Glynn Supporter of Administration. ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 1.—Gov. Martin H. Glynn said that he is a warm admirer and strong supporter of President Woodrow Wilson, whom he recognizes as the leader of the Democratic party, notwithstanding that many of the strongest supporters of the President have announced that they will support John A. Hennessey for Governor.
