**WICKERSHAM SAYS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—The Alas-
ka coal land leasing bill that passed
the House of Representatives Satur-
day provides for the leasing of Alaska
coal lands for a period of years, the
government to get two cents a ton
royalty for all the coal mined.

Delegate James Wickersham, of Al-
aska, is displeased with the bill, and
says he believes there will not be a
single entry of coal land made under
it, but that it can be tried while the
government is building a railroad in
Alaska that will make it available,
and if it does not work out, it can be
amended.

other Senators will endeavor to se-
cure several amendments to the bill
which will improve it.

**NORTH SEA MINE BLOWS
UP BRITISH CRUISER**

LONDON, Sept. 7.—The British
cruiser Pathfinder was
blown up by a mine in the
North sea. The paymaster was
killed, and the commander and
six junior and two petty offi-
cers are missing.

The Pathfinder was a small
cruiser of 2340 tons, armed
with ten 12-pounders. She
was built in 1905.

**PASSENGER SHIP BLOWN
UP.**

LONDON, Sept. 7.—The Wil-
son passenger liner Runo, with
600 passengers on board, was
blown up by a mine in the
North sea. Twenty lives were
lost.

**EXTRA TAX TO
FALL ON LIQUOR**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—The Dem-
ocratic members of the House ways
and means committee have virtually
agreed upon the commodities that are
susceptible of taxation for the pur-
pose of producing the additional re-
venues that will be required by the
government on account of the re-
ductions due from the decrease in
importations on account of the war
in Europe.

It is proposed that there shall be
levied a tax of 50 cents a barrel on
beer, two cents a gallon on domestic
wines, a tax on all proprietary medi-
cines, distilled liquors and all soft
drinks.

**CANADIANS FIRE
ON JACKLING YACHT**

SEATTLE, Sept. 7.—Telegrams re-
ceived from San Francisco say that
the yacht, Cyprus, owned by Col. D.
C. Jackling, the Alaska gold mine op-
erator, was fired upon from the Vic-
toria fortifications when she tried to
enter Esquimalt without first having
secured the consent of the Admiralty.
