OSTEND.

Ostend, through which port Britain and Russia continue to pour troops to assault the Germans, is situated in the Province of West Flanders, Belgium. Population (1904) 41,181. Situated on the North Sea, it forms almost the central point of the forty-two miles of seacoast belonging to Belgium. Though its earlier history was stormy, its fortifications were removed in 1865, since which time the new town has been created. In 1900 extensive harbor works were commenced and at the present time its docks accommodate numbers of ships of large tonnage. Ostend enjoys an extensive passenger and provision traffic with England and is the headquarters of the Belgian fishing fleet. The city is in direct railway communication with Brussels, Cologne and Berlin, and is also the starting point of several light railways along the coast, and to the southern towns of Flanders. Although threatened during the early German movement in Belgium, no attempt was made by the invading troops to capture it. Recently, a large detachment of British marines landed to reinforce the small force of Belgians stationed there.

GERMAN OFFICIAL CALLS BRUSSELS GERMAN CITY

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 14.—The Telegram prints a Berlin dispatch saying that when the people of Brussels protested against the town clocks being set ahead an hour to synchronize with those of Berlin, Gen. Von der Goltz replied: "In Germany there should be only one time."

WITTE SAYS TURKEY WILL NOT FIGHT

LONDON, Sept. 14.—A Central News dispatch from Petrograd says Count de Witte has arrived at Odessa from Constantinople and it quotes him as saying that Turkey will not go to war.

TWO MURDER TRIALS AT SEWARD TERM

SEWARD, Sept. 6.—Seven criminal cases will be tried here when the court convenes October 2d. Two of these will be murder trials, one from Knik and one from Alitka. The principals in the last named affair are Mexicans. Judge W. H. Whittlesay has every case possible that was met by the floating court brought for trial to the Seward term. The judge believes that the grand jury for the term will be selected soon if it has not been selected already. It is likely that the jury will be drawn from this district in which event it may not be drawn until the court comes. Among the other cases to be tried here will be the cases arising from the Pribiloff alleged scandals. At Dillingham six indictments were brought in, two of which were not true bills.

NEWS OF BURWASH GOLD MINING DISTRICT

J. Bradner and Herb. Roper who arrived in Whitehorse from Vancouver last October on the way to Chisana, leaving for that place almost immediately, came back to town Wednesday evening, not having been nearer Chisana than Burwash creek where they have been since last fall and where they have been working practically all the time since with rather indifferent results, having brought with them but \$600 worth of gold. C. M. Crawford and wife who came in with Bradner and Roper last fall and who were with them on Burwash, are still there and expect to stay during the winter. Bradner and Roper report Sydney Frank and partner doing fairly well on upper Burwash where they are sluicing an average of six dollars each per day, the gold being found at from six inches to two feet from the surface. Alex Fisher is doing better than wages on Sheep creek. The same is said of Tom Kerulsh and his partner on Fourth of July creek.—Whitehorse Star.

CORWIN JOINS RACE FOR KARLUK'S CREW

NOME, Sept. 7.—The sturdy little steamship Corwin, of Seattle, formerly a famous revenue cutter, has joined the fleet which is bound into the Arctic to rescue the members of the Stefansson expedition marooned on Wrangell Island. Jafet Lindberg, a prominent mining man of Nome, advanced the money to provision and coal the Corwin for the dash to Wrangell Island. Capt. Dick Healy is in command and her crew is of picked men. The Corwin has dogs sledges and skin boats and the expedition is prepared for a trip over any sort of ice. The United States revenue cutter Bear, the Russian steamship Talmay and the gasoline power schooner King & Winge are also bound for Wrangell Island to attempt the rescue.

GREAT BRITAIN IS TARGET OF WRATH

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 14.—The Hamburger Nachrichten, Bismarck's old paper, editorially declares: "We have taken the field against Russia and France, but at the bottom it is England we are fighting everywhere. It is from England we must write the utmost price for this gigantic struggle, however dearly the others may have to pay for the help they have given her."

TURNER FORCES CLAIM VICTORY IN PRIMARY

SEATTLE, Sept. 14.—At the headquarters of former Senator George Turner in this city it is claimed that Senator Turner has been nominated for United States Senator by a plurality of 250 over Judge W. W. Black, who leads former George F. Cotterill by a few hundred votes.

SEWARD RANCH BEATS ANYTHING OUTSIDE
