TAKU JIM MEETS SHOCKING DEATH

"Taku Jim," the well known native Indian resident here and a member of the Wolf clan, was electrocuted about two o'clock this afternoon, death resulting instantly from coming in contact with the high tension transmission cable of the Treadwell company at a point near the Standard Oil company's dock. The body was badly burned.

The accident happened under peculiar circumstances. Jim was aboard his gas boat when it drifted alongside the point where the cables pass on poles along the beach. The mast of the boat touched the cable and Jim came in contact with it by taking hold of the wire stay supporting the masts.
