WOULD CONNECT ALASKA WITH SOUTH AMERICA

The stimulation of commerce between North and South America due to the European war has revived interest in the project of an all-rail route connecting the United States with the countries of the Southern Hemisphere, says the November Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Such a railway, reaching continuously from the great plateau of Central Alaska to the pampas of South America and beyond, would constitute the biggest enterprise of its kind ever undertaken, if it were not that more than half of the line has already been built, and is in operation.

Half a dozen different routes would be available for forming the link through the United States. Over a route passing down the Pacific coast to El Paso, Tex., and thence through Mexico City to Ayutla, the total distance of rail from Fairbanks, Alaska to Buenos Ayres, Argentina, would be about 12,700 miles.

Every variety of climate, from arctic to tropical, as well as topographical conditions of the most diverse kind, would be encountered in building and operating such a line.

Owing to the difficult construction and the long gaps to be filled, by far the biggest expenditures will be required in building through Central America and the Northern part of South America. This is the portion of the line surveyed and estimated for the Pan-American railway.

The American Press Association has sent out plate pictures of Colonel Goethals builder of the Panama canal, who has been slated to build the Alaska railroad, and an article accompanying the engraving says: "If he makes the dirt fly in Alaska as fast as he did the Panama Alaskans will be traveling in Pullmans instead of dog teams from one place to another."
