MASTODON SKULL TO GO TO EXPOSITION

SEATTLE, Dec. 5.—A gigantic mastodon skull, dug from the frozen ground 110 feet below the surface, has been brought to Seattle by Capt. S. C. Barrington, president of the Slide-stream Navigation Co. of Dawson.

The skull and two enormous tusks were dug out of a mine shaft within 30 miles of Dawson by George Nunan, a miner.

The ground was frozen from the surface down, and the miners thawed it out with a wood fire as they dug. They broke off a piece of the skull before they realized what they were finding.

While the people of Alaska are barred from passing any laws affecting the liquor traffic, they have a means of bringing the desire for such legislation before Congress through their legislative bodies.

REPORTS RICH STRIKE IN THE KUSKOKWIM

SEWARD, Nov. 30.—Dr. Green of Tacoma, in a letter to Frank Cotter, reports the discovery of a great paystreak on Candle Creek, a tributary of the Tatalona which flows into the Tatalona.

Writing of the ground, the doctor says: "The paystreak here is 150 feet wide and gets wider as it goes down stream, being 480 feet where they quit drilling. The drill holes show an average of 37 to the square foot of bedrock along the left bank of the paystreak. Thirty feet from this vein it averages 40 and from that place to the extreme right limit of the paystreak it gradually tapers off to fifty cents to the square foot of bedrock."

ANOTHER MURDER IN BRISTOL BAY

VALDEZ, Nov. 27.—On October 13, Sakar Judas shot and killed a native named Wassella about 15 miles above Naknek, and shot and wounded Banley Kovik, also a native, at the same time.

It seems Wassella had been abusing the mother of Judas, a boy 12 years of age, and he secured a gun and shot Wassella through the forehead, just between the eyes, killing him instantly.
