He is the first enlisted man ever made captain of any athletic team in the navy. Grandall was the all-star choice for left halfback last season in the navy.

Joe Choyinski, the veteran heavyweight who is boxing instructor at the Pittsburgh A. C. has developed quite a string of amateur boxer scrappers. Jim Flynn, by knocking out "One Round" Davis, has saved his meal ticket for a while at least, as it will pave the way for getting on other matches.

Rob McAllister, the California heavyweight, is in New York, looking for bouts. Several other California boxers are expected to take up their residence in Gotham now that the ring game has been lifted in their home state.

WAR SIDELIGHTS.

A Berlin correspondent of the Times says regarding the removal of Von Moltke: "According to one story, when Von Kluck was still making his seasonal advance in the first few weeks of the war, Von Moltke was for having him continue on to the coast, while the other members of the board of directors voted in bloc for the more spectacular move of having Von Kluck turn to the Southward and swoop down on Paris. The Kaiser gave the final decision against Von Moltke, whose adrocted strategy was thoroughly justified by the subsequent events. According to the explanation, the former chief of staff made himself unpopular by using too much lavishness in the aerial and useless squandering of life, diminishing the Kaiser's troops in buying minor successes of no great strategical value or even tactical value."

Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, of Germany says: "Even the occupation of Warsaw and of the Vistula line would by no means signify the end of the campaign. Russians, with their immense territories, can fall back indefinitely. Defeated at Warsaw, they can fall back on Kiev, from Kiev on Moscow and eventually even on Vladivostok. Of course we cannot follow them that far."

LONDON—Second Lieutenant Cyril Asquith, of the Queen's Westminster, son of Premier Asquith, who enlisted early in December, has filed a request with the War Office to be sent to the front with the next contingent.

Noel Burton, member of the English parliament, who toured the Balkans in the interest of the establishment of a Balkan alliance, says that despite the wonderful rally of the Serbs which resulted in their big victory over the Austrians, Serbia cannot hope to withstand Austria indefinitely.

The Berlin Tageblatt claims that the greatest number of new troops the Allies can put into the Western theatre is 1,250,000.

The German arrest of Cardinal Mercier of Belgium, who is imprisoned in the archbishop's palace, was to the publication of his letter stating that the Belgians do not owe the invaders obedience.

The London Daily Chronicle prints an article in which it claims that Austria-Hungary is solidly united in support of war and believes in the ultimate victory of its allies.

Herbert Corey writes an article in the Globe that hotel food prices in Berlin, London and New York are about on a parity.

LONDON—The American relief commission is obliged to have pens cooked before distributing them to the Belgians. When they were issued raw, the Belgians hoarded them for future planting.

PARIS—One of Gen. Joffre's staff says that the commander has not read a newspaper since the war began, that he does not drink or smoke, and writes no letters except brief notes to his wife and sister.

Cargoes of American food, clothing and medical supplies already delivered to Belgium, or in transit or arranged for, amount to more than \$14,000,000.

BOULOGNE—In St. Omer, 25 miles behind the front, is a military hospital conducted exclusively by English and French women. All the surgeons, nurses, and orderlies are women. All wounded soldiers, whether French, British or German, are treated without distinction.

Since the beginning of the war prices of meat in London has increased 15 per cent, flour 25 per cent, coal, 10 per cent, and fish 200 per cent.

The war in Europe has been in progress over five months, but neither the Germans nor the Allies, according to the opinion of the military observers can claim a decided advantage. Both sides have met with reverses, and while the most advanced positions are held by the armies of the Kaiser, it is claimed in London that the German advance is, for the time being, at a standstill. The Russians steadily backwards along the Southern Galician railway and out of the Northern foothills of the Carpathians, according to reported reports from the theatre of war. The remarkable thing which has upset all the calculations of outside observers, is the energy and general activity with which the offensive operations of the European armies have been maintained during the winter months, even in the frozen areas of Poland.

CORDOVA PICTURES TO BE AT 'FRICO FAIR. SEATTLE, Jan. 15.—Cordova and the country to the north of it along the Copper river is going to be brought to the attention of visitors at the San Francisco exposition, if E. A. Heig prevails upon the authorities, as he hopes. Mr. Heig is a photographer of Cordova, and he is on his way to California with several thousand views, for which he is going to seek space in the Alaska building. He bears letters to the authorities from the Cordova Chamber of Commerce, which he represents, and from Gov. Strong.

Mr. Heig has been in the North 17 years, going up first to the Klondike, and he was the first photographer to the interior. He has been established in Cordova for considerable time, and during his stay there has taken

some exceptionally fine pictures. In addition to a large number of beautifully finished small views, Mr. Heig carries with him the negatives of photographs of the Childs glacier and the Miles glacier. The first negative is ten feet long, and the picture which will be printed from it will be the feature of the exhibit with the picture of the Miles glacier, eight feet in length, running it a close second. "I expect to be in San Francisco for about two months," said he shortly after his arrival on the steamship Alameda. "It will take six weeks, anyway, to get all these pictures in shape and on the walls." (Seattle Post-Intelligencer.)
