CHISANA MINER SUES FOR TYING UP BANK ACCOUNT

SEATTLE, Jan. 20.—Fletcher T. Hamshaw, well known in the White River district of Alaska as one of those who were first on the ground when the gold strike at Chisana was made three years ago, started suit in the Superior Court yesterday to recover \$15,835 as damages from F. G. Manley, J. J. Price, John L. McClain, and E. J. Ives. Mr. Hamshaw says he was damaged in that amount when the defendants, by mistake, garnished his account at the Scandinavian-American bank, September 8, 1914, and curtailed his mining operations at Chisana. Mr. Hamshaw says in his complaint that he had a balance of \$2,500 to his credit at the Scandinavian-American bank, when the defendants obtained a garnishee writ. The garnishee was voluntarily dismissed by the defendants on September 12, when the mistake was discovered, but that on September 20, the defendants had \$2,396.75 of his money in their possession which they refused to deliver to him. At that time he was engaged in extensive placer mining operations at Chisana and required the money to maintain his credit.
