ORDINANCE BEING TESTED IN COURT

Habens Corpus proceedings in the case of Ben (Cudov) vs. the Town of Juneau, were begun before Judge R. W. Jennings at 5 p. m. yesterday afternoon, but after an hour of argument and citing of authorities by Attorney John Rustgard, counsel for the plaintiff the case was continued by the court until 2:30 p. m. today.

Attorney Rustgard first gave his attention to the municipal court itself, his argument being that the city council of Juneau had no right to create a municipal court without setting a limit to its power and designating a mode of procedure for it and that in failing to do so, they had created a court in name only, a court which did not exist so far as the federal law was concerned.

In regard to the "eleven o'clock" ordinance, he contended that it was too vague in meaning; that a city council has only delegated and necessary powers, and that the city council by its "eleven o'clock" ordinance, has created a misdemeanor out of something which is not unlawful or in violation of federal statutes. Further, that it discriminates between those who have work and those who have not.

"Being out of work is no basis for which to charge one with the crime of vagrancy," Attorney Rustgard declared.

Police Committee's Position. F. Wolland, chairman of the police committee, when asked what move if any the council would make in the criticism of Chief Sillter and the "eleven o'clock" ordinance replied, "You can quote me as saying that we do not propose to do anything about it. We did not pass the "eleven o'clock" ordinance. It has been on the books for years. Neither did we instruct Chief Sillter to carry it out. It is a city ordinance, and if he does not enforce all of the ordinances he is remiss in his duty. If the ordinance is void, that is a different matter altogether.

"I understand there is a petition going around. I have not seen it. Last fall we had a chief who did not enforce enough law, now we have one who enforces too much, so we don't intend to pay attention to any squealing about it."
