NOTED ENGINEER COMING NORTH

John S. Eastwood, a noted hydraulic engineer of California who has been preparing plans for the development of the Segei river water power, will visit Alaska in the near future to look after some business interests in the Territory.

Mr. Eastwood is famed as the inventor of the Multiple-Arch dam. California papers have given much space to the Multiple-Arch, as the most revolutionary step yet taken in the way of designs for concrete dams.

Last year in California the floods took out millions of dollars worth of steel and concrete dams, but of the dams that Eastwood designed, not one gave way, although the water rushed over some of them fifteen and twenty feet deep.

The Multiple-Arch is what the name signifies, a series of arches placed on edge concave toward the current, and it is claimed that the cost of construction is 45 per cent. less than any other design so far built.

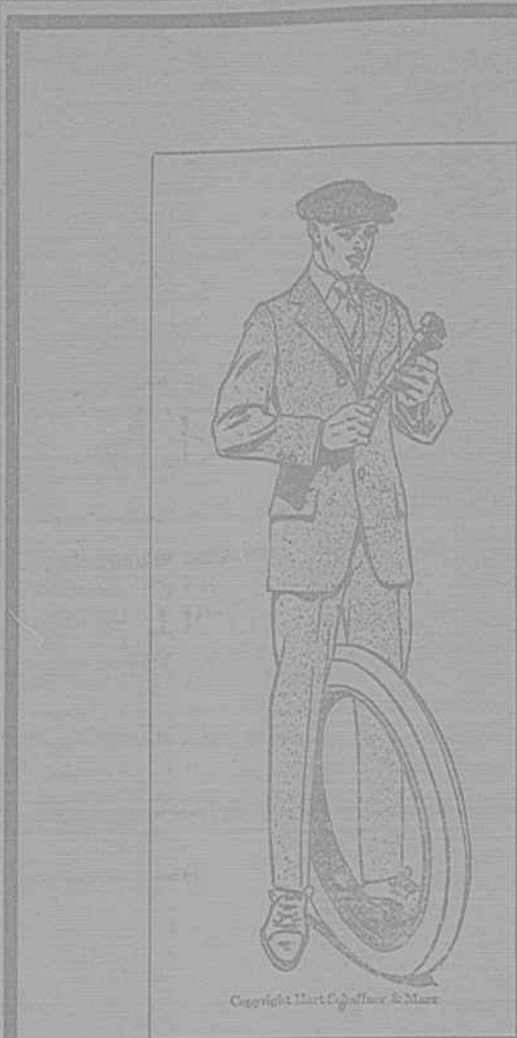
