DEADLOCK HALTS THE ASSEMBLY

held on this question.

The House's action in killing the Hubbard school bill, which provided for an election two years hence of a school superintendent, and the subsequent formulation of a school system by a board, practically killed the bill appropriating 25 per cent. of the forest money for school purposes. While this question was under discussion in the Senate, Senator Suler renewed S. B. 1, asking for forest reserve money for roads and trails in the First division. He moved to amend the bill by making appropriation of \$9900 for a school at Craig. "We need this school, and if we have no general school bill, that money will lie in the treasury, doing no one any good," he said. Senator Millard wanted the money left in the Treasury. Senator Hubbard raised a point of order against the bill and Committee Chairman Aldrich sustained him, whereupon Senator Suler with some heat declared that "sooner or later your rulings against the First division will result in putting the First division out of it altogether."

The education committee's school bill was then laid on the table, as was H. B. 43, changing the procedure of admitting attorneys to the bar. Attorney General "Peeluk" and there may be no attorney-general. H. B. 81, the Driscoll measure, rested serenely in its paper jacket this afternoon, while other matters had the right of way. The House amendments to the compensation act also had not been acted on at 4:30 p. m.

S. B. 30, relating to assessment work, and uprooting the Waskey law, passed the House this morning, 11 to 3. Representative Moran of Seward vigorously opposed the bill and Representative Snow and Tansy stood with him in the voting. Representatives Burns, Coombs, Daly, Day, Driscoll, Getchell, Heckman, Held, Holland, Shoup and Speaker Collins voted "aye."

The House this morning passed the joint memorial to Congress asking that the limitations in the organic act forbidding the Alaska legislature from controlling the Territory's fishing resources be removed.

JUDGE JENNINGS TO MEET SALOONMEN

Judge Robert W. Jennings, of the United States District court, announced this afternoon that it is his desire to meet all those holding licenses to sell intoxicating liquor at Juneau and Douglas and others interested tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the court room at the court house. It is his purpose to explain to them how he desires the census taken as a basis for the issuance of saloon licenses for the coming year.
