FLAG AT SUMMIT IS DELAPIDATED

Her patriotism inflamed by the condition of the American flag at the "summit" of the White Pass railroad, where Yukon Territory meets Alaska, Mrs. Albro Akin of New York, a tourist on the steamship City of Seattle, today lodged with Gov. J. F. A. Strong a protest, voicing the indignation of other passengers aboard the City of Seattle.

Mrs. Akin wrote her protest, as the Governor's office was not open when the "Seattle" stopped here early this morning.

"Will you kindly make inquiries at Skagway of customs officials and others of the disgraceful condition of the American flag at White Pass? The flag is only pieces, in rags, dirty, and evidently thrown on the ground and uncared for.

Two years ago a similar story was brought from the Summit by the members of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce excursion. At that time E. B. Burwell of Seattle headed a committee which bought a flag, and raised by its English cousin with great ceremony.
