"MIDNIGHT SUN" EXCURSIONISTS GO TO YUKON

Bound for Fort Yukon, where on June 21—the longest day of the year—they will see the famous midnight sun, sixty-seven tourists from all parts of the United States reached Juneau yesterday on the steamship City of Seattle, and were here for three hours before their steamer continued to Skagway. The tourists are headed by Henry Ainsley-Higham of New York, a member of the Raymond-Whitcomb tour, which arranged the trip. Connection will be made at Skagway with the White Pass railroad, and at Whitehorse, Y. T., with a river steamer that will take them to any part of Fort Yukon. Among the members of the party is Finlay L. McFarland, a wealthy automobile man of Denver, accompanied by Mrs. McFarland.

BIG SHAFT AT CENTRAL HOIST, TREADWELL, BREAKS

TREADWELL, June 19.—A break occurred in the Central hoist at two o'clock this morning that will take at least a month to repair, and may necessitate the closing down of the hoist for the next three months.

The break is in the main shaft of the hoist and is about three feet from the left end between the drum and connecting rod on the engine. This shaft is probably the heaviest piece of forged steel in Alaska. It is 40 feet long, 19 inches in diameter and weighs 25 tons.

The closing of this hoist will mean that extra crews will have to be put on at the Mexican and Treadwell hotels in order to supply rock to all the mills.

The Central hoist was finished a little over three years ago and is the largest hoisting plant on the Pacific Coast, and was intended to supply all the mills on the Island with the exception of the Ready Bullion.

The reason for the possible long delay in the repair work is that in all probability the shaft will have to be made in Bethlehem, Pa., and the steel

CANADA'S WHEAT CROP OUTLOOK IS GOOD

WINNIPEG, June 19.—Never have prospects for grain crops been as good as this season of the year in the history of Western Canada. All the provinces have now had an abundance of rain, sufficient to keep the grain in good shape until stocking time. Alberta and Saskatchewan had good rains and favorable weather right from the start. Manitoba suffered from a lack of moisture up to ten days ago, when showers fell, and heavy rains have been falling daily since. It is too early to predict a crop, but it never had such a good start as this year. Prices will not be as high as predicted. October wheat is now quoted at \$1.50, when some farmers had been looking forward to \$1.75 wheat.

ALASKA-JUNEANU

BOSTON, June 8.—Director Requa of the Alaska Juneau company, telegraphs that President Bradley, who has been ill for some weeks, sails for Honolulu the 12th of this month to be absent until the end of July. Director Mackenzie leaves for Juneau on the 19th, directors having authorized him to perform all necessary acts in connection with the opening of the mine to deliver 8,000 tons of ore daily and erect a mill to treat the product.—(Boston News Bureau.)

ALASKA GOLD

SALT LAKE CITY, June 8.—Before leaving for Butte, D. C. Jackling said that all their properties were working at the maximum. The most surprising performance was that of the Alaska Gold Mines, where over since the first ton of ore went through the mill they have made a profit. The single section now operating is bearing all the fixed overhead charges, and some money was made during March. During April the earnings were entirely satisfactory, and in May they were still better, while June will be a better month than any of the others. The mill is working so well that the costs will be below the original estimates. Work done gives substantial proof that the original report was conservative.—(Boston News Bureau.)
