

DEMURRERS OVERRULED

Judge Robert W. Jennings this morning overruled the demurrers filed by Jack Johnson, William Bell, Bob Stangland, Tim Torgenson, Mamie Johnson and Charles Kavander in the four suits brought against them by the Alaska Juneau Gold Mining Company for the restoration of property along the Juneau waterfront, claimed by the plaintiffs, as millites.

In the petition of H. C. Strong of Ketchikan for a limitation of his liability in the proceedings brought by C. A. Holmes to recover damages from the steamship Al-Kl, Judge Jennings held that he had no jurisdiction, and the petition was denied. Holmes sued the Northland Steamship company, former owners of the Al-Kl, in the King County Superior Court, Seattle, asking \$21,250 damages for personal injuries. He was given a judgment for \$5,000. The judgment was transferred to the Alaska courts, and suit was instituted here to attach Strong's property.

ALASKA HUNTERS MAY KILL ONLY THREE DEER YEARLY

Only three deer may be killed by one person during the open season in Southeastern Alaska, according to an announcement received by Gov. J. E. A. Strong yesterday from the Department of Agriculture announcing the amendment of regulations for the protection of deer, moose, caribou, sheep and mountain goats in Alaska. The communication reads as follows: By virtue of the authority conferred upon the Secretary of Agriculture by Section 2 of the act of May 11, 1908 (35 Stat. 102), entitled "An act to amend an act entitled 'An act for the protection of game in Alaska, and for other purposes,' approved June 7, 1902," regulations 2 and 3 of the "Regulations for the protection of deer, moose, caribou, sheep and mountain goats in Alaska," made and published July 14, 1914, are hereby amended, effective on and after August 1, 1915, so as to read as follows:

Regulation 2. Limits. — The number of deer killed by any one person during the open season in Southeastern Alaska is hereby limited to three. Regulation 3. Sale. — The sale of deer carcasses in Southern Alaska is hereby suspended until August 1, 1915.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and official seal this 26th day of June, 1915. D. F. HOUSTON, Secretary of Agriculture.

Regulations As Amended The regulations for the protection of deer, moose, caribou, sheep, and mountain goats in Alaska, as amended June 30, 1915, are as follows: 1. The season for killing deer in Southeastern Alaska is hereby limited to the period from August 15 to November 1 both inclusive.

3. The sale of deer carcasses in Southeastern Alaska is hereby suspended until August 1, 1915. 4. The killing of deer on Kodiak Island and Long Island and the killing of deer on the following islands in Southeastern Alaska: Duke Island, near Dixon's Entrance; Gravina Island, near Ketchikan; Krutzof Island, west of Sitka; Sumner Island, near Klawack; and Zarembo Island, near Wrangell, is hereby prohibited until August 1, 1915.

HEAT WAVE CONTINUES UNABATED

Forest fires which have been burning the timber along the Mendenhall road at various times during the past three weeks, are again under control. Ranger Babbitt's crew of volunteers having made good progress in stopping the march of the flames. The hot weather continues, and reports from outlying points indicate an unprecedented dryness. L. E. Spray, who has returned from a trip to the North, says that the Kootenai and Sullivan rivers are flooding their valleys, and the Chillat has overflowed its banks, back of Haines. The streams are fed by glaciers, and the ice has melted very rapidly, owing to the intense heat.

Crops are thriving, with the exception of the strawberries, which have suffered from the lack of rain. At Haines irrigation has been necessary to relieve the situation. Generally speaking, Southeastern Alaska has been in the "torrid zone" for almost two months. Outside papers have widely commented on Alaska's heat wave. Reports sent out from Juneau have varied, some of the papers publishing news that the temperature recorded here last week was 100 degrees, and others printing that 90 degrees was the maximum reached by the mercury. The latter temperature was correct.

Through the East and middle States the summer has been much cooler than last year, but the hot season is now on in full blast, especially in Chicago and other cities in that section. The Charleston Mail, published at West Virginia's capital by former Gov. Walter E. Clark of Alaska, editorially comments:

"The announcement that temperature in Juneau, Alaska, has registered one hundred degrees, probably indicates where our early summer weather got stranded. However, it is also very apparent that it did not tarry forever in Alaska."

DISCOVER NEW PAY ON POORMAN CREEK

The report of Territorial Mine Inspector William Maloney for the month of June has just been received at the Governor's office. This report shows that 16 mines were inspected in the Ruby district, 13 in the Iditarod district, and 6 in the Wade Hampton district. Inspector Maloney states that all of these mines are in a "reasonably safe condition."

Only one accident is listed in the report, that in the case of Julius Sharick, who was employed on the Beilley & Marston dredge on Otter Creek in the Iditarod district. Sharick was struck in the eye by a piece of steel and was forced to lay off for a month. He is reported as having completely recovered.

The outlook for mining in the Ruby and Iditarod districts is very favorable" says the report, "and if plenty of water is available the output should be greatly in excess of last year's."

New Pay Creeks A new pay creek, known as Spruce Creek, in the Poorman district, was located this spring, and from present indications it should prove to be a good producer. New pay has also been struck on the highest benches of Poorman creek, and the miners there feel confident that they will make a good showing this year.

In the Wade Hampton district there has been some new pay discovered on a creek called Willow Creek, but up to the time of the Inspector's visit not enough work had been done to determine the extent of the pay. Bedrock mining were being done in a number of the properties on the creek. On one of the locations the Inspector got an 8-cent pan on the 8-foot level of the drain.

Some very good looking quartz has been discovered on a claim at the head of Willow creek. Good values in free gold are shown, but no assays had been made to determine the actual value, up to the time of the Inspector's visit.

To Nome For Summer Inspector Maloney will spend the summer in the Nome and Seward Peninsula districts, and will return to Fairbanks on the last up-river steamer. The Inspector's headquarters are in Nome, but it is his custom to spend the winter in Fairbanks. Mr. Maloney left Fairbanks late in May.

MOLASSES TANK SHIP TO BE CONSTRUCTED BOSTON, July 28.—Another large ship-building contract obtained by the Fore River Shipbuilding Corporation has been announced. It is a tank steamer for the Cuban Distilling Co., and is a sister ship of the steamer now in the course of construction at the yards, which will be called the Catalist. The newer ship is contracted for to be 389 feet long, 54 feet 6 inches beam, 32 feet 6 inches depth and 5,000 tons displacement. It will be capable of carrying 2,500,000 gallons of molasses. About a year will be required to construct the vessel.

The contract is the second received within two weeks, the former being a 10,000-ton cargo capacity freight steamer for Edgar F. Luckenbach, of New York. The yard now has about 5,000 employees.

MISS COWLEY WILL REMAIN IN JUNEAU Friends of Miss Elsie Cowley, formerly a member of the nursing staff at St. Ann's hospital have been glad to hear that she has decided to remain in Juneau and will continue private nursing here throughout the winter. Miss Cowley is at present in St. Ann's recuperating from an operation for appendicitis recently performed by Dr. Dawes. She expects to go back to her work again in about three weeks.
