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MORE RAIN AT SITKA THAN HERE

Does it rain more at Sitka than in Juneau? This is a question that has often been asked, but seldom answered with any degree of authority.

In his weather report for the month of July, Observer Reid of Juneau pointed out that there were 27 days on which it did not rain.

Compared with the weather report of Observer C. C. Georgeson of Sitka, the Juneau report gives the capital city the clearest weather, at least for July.

The Sitka report for the past month shows but eleven clear days, in Sitka according to the report it rained on July 1, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 11, 21, 22, 24 and 31.

The maximum temperature recorded at Sitka was 79 degrees on July 27. Juneau's highest mark was on July 26th, when the temperature reached 89 degrees.
