BOTH PARTIES FIND HOPE IN ELECTION RETURNS

Both the Democratic and Republican parties find hope in the returns from last week's elections. In official statements given out both parties show that the Progressive party has about gone to pieces, but the Democrats claim that a large part of it is going to them. The Republicans also claim they are returning to that party. The Republicans admitted that in Kentucky the Democrats saved themselves from defeat by bringing in National issues. They were divided by factional differences.

Democratic Statement

A statement just issued from the headquarters of the Democratic national committee said:

"The results yesterday show that the election results show that have gotten together in some states, the Democracy has made large gains from the Progressive ranks. This is notably true in Massachusetts, from which state the first official returns are available. The Democratic gubernatorial candidate, Gov. Walsh, made a wonderful race. He polled the largest vote ever given a Democrat, while Mr. McCall, the Republican candidate, ran way behind the normal Republican vote given party nominees in recent years. The boast of the Republicans in Massachusetts that they would carry the state by from 25,000 to 40,000 majority remains unfulfilled.

Comparison of Vote

"The total vote given Walsh yesterday was 229,312, while McCall received 235,918 votes. The vote for Gov. Walsh was nearly 20,000 greater than he received two years ago and 37,900 more than he received in 1912. President Wilson received 175,000 votes, as against 298,175 for Taft and Roosevelt. Taft received 295,936 votes in 1908, which is 30,000 more than the vote given McCall yesterday. In this connection the important fact should not be overlooked that Massachusetts is one of the old line Republican states. It has elected Republican legislators and Republican United States senators for generations. The Democratic party, which has always been the minority party, is stronger in the state today than it has ever been before.

Victories For Democrats

"There were three state results yesterday—where governors were chosen. The Democrats elected the state ticket in two out of the three states. While they lost the governorship in Massachusetts, a heretofore strong Republican state, they elected a Democrat to replace the present Republican governor in Maryland. In Kentucky the Democrats elected their candidate for governor, Hon. A. O. Stanley, whose election was opposed by a number of Republican spellbinders of national reputation, including former vice president Fairbanks. The fine victories in two of these closely contested states, and the very remarkable race made by the party leader in the other is highly gratifying to the national democracy for all of the states have been in the Republican fold during the past few years.

"The results yesterday are full of encouragement to Democrats, demonstrating conclusively that it is the constructive and gaining party, while the Republicans have failed signally in their efforts to force back into the ranks progressive and independent Republicans."

Republican Statement

Charles D. Hillis, chairman of the Republican national committee, dictated the following statement on the results of the election:

"The result of yesterday's election must be anything but gratifying to the national administration. The contest in the Democratic state of Maryland is so very close that the result will be in doubt until decided by the official canvass. In the Democratic state of Kentucky, where national questions were lugged in by the Democrats to avoid a drubbing, the Republicans have shown their old-time form. We have carried Cincinnati by the largest plurality ever given a candidate in that city.

Control the Legislatures

"The Republicans have retained control of the legislatures in New York and New Jersey; have elected local officers in up-state New York, and all officers in Philadelphia. They have swept Massachusetts by pluralities ranging from 10,000 to 30,000, electing all state officers and 160 Republican members of the legislature, against 79 Democrats.

"We have carried the one congressional district in Pennsylvania and three in New York, one of which, the Twenty-Third, has been held by a Democrat.

"The Boston Post contended that the National administration was on trial, and that the election of McCall

would be a vote of lack of confidence in the policies of President Wilson. "Surely the national administration cannot point with pride and pretend to be complimented by the success of Tammany Hall in securing control of local New York offices and aiding in the defeat of the New York constitution."

CHILDREN'S CANTATA TOMORROW AT RINK

Twelve whole months will be sung by a chorus of 129 children's voices tomorrow night and Saturday night at the Rink theatre when the students of the grade and high schools present "The Months and the Seasons" for the benefit of the Juneau public library.

The children have been practicing every afternoon and have even given their recess time to the work of preparing for this first children's cantata ever given in Juneau. They are working under the direction of M. E. Robertson who not long ago directed an entertainment of the same sort in Seattle.

Several solists will lead the chorus at times throughout the program and will represent the different months of the year. These solists are Warren Geddes, John Taylor, Nell Kasseharoff, Dorothy Olson, Daisy Lundstrom, Frances Nowell, Lida Olds, Vivian Dale, Jean Stevens, Velma Case, Eva Tripp, and Freda Broberg.

The scarf dance will be another beautiful feature of the program and will be presented by girls of the high school as follows: Emma Perelle, Gertrude Nelson, Esther Sutton, Frances Plack, Marie Latton, Georgia Gilpatrick and Belle Hood.

Special decorations have been planned and the theatre will be very attractively garbed for the occasion. Tickets are on sale at the library. General admission is 25c and 50c, while seats are reserved for 75c.

REAL PLAYGROUND ASSURED BY CLUB

At their meeting held in the Council chamber this afternoon the Library Extension and Playground department of the Juneau Woman's Club discussed as their main topic the question of getting a playground for the children of Juneau. It is the intention of the Women's Club to make definite plans for securing a playground in the near future and although the ways and means were thoroughly discussed this afternoon the methods that will finally be adopted are yet to be definitely decided upon.

The clubwomen intend to provide, if possible, a playground that will compare favorably with the playgrounds of the larger cities, and will use the successful playfields of the States as a basis for their working plans.

Playground instructors in the States are provided by the civil service and are required to pass the usual civil service examinations before being eligible to hold an authoritative position on the playfields. While it is not probable that the Juneau field will be provided with an instructor in accordance with this scheme in the near future, the work will certainly tend in that direction, and the little folks of Juneau may look forward to having very soon "somewhere to play" that will be their very own.

All departments of the Women's Club will plan out their work during the next two weeks and will report their proposed programs at a general meeting to be held in the council chambers on November 23rd.

"QUARTER HUNDRED" DANCE PRETTY EVENT
