"U" AND W.S.C. CLAIMANTS TO CHAMPIONSHIP

SEATTLE, Nov. 25.—On a slow field, the University of Washington team trounced the University of Colorado eleven, here yesterday, 45 to 9. It was announced after the game by Coach Gilmour Doble, of the Washington team, that he had tendered his resignation to the Associated Students, and it was reported that he was negotiating with the University of Wisconsin student body for a place at Madison next season. Washington will make a strong effort to keep the famous mentor in Seattle. Washington's defeat of Colorado closed the eighth successful season under Doble, without defeat. Although the University did not take part in the Northwest conference games this year, owing to a squabble with the other members of the conference on the matter of playing games in Seattle, it met and defeated a number of good teams, and Seattle sporting writers claim it is the strongest eleven on the Pacific Coast. CHAMPIONSHIP IS PULLMAN'S SPOKANE SAYS

SPOKANE, Nov. 25.—The Spokesman-Review claims today that the Washington State College football team of Pullman is the strongest eleven west of the Mississippi river. The Argles yesterday defeated Gonzaga College 48 to 0, and the Spokesman-Review points out, Doble's University of Washington team had hard work in beating Gonzaga, 22 to 7, Gonzaga this year had for its coach the redoubtable "Wee" Coyte, for four years quarterback for the University of Washington, and the pick of all critics for all-Northwestern-quarterback. Coyte declared today that W. S. C. should beat the University of Washington this year, and expressed regret that the two elevens were unable to bury the hatchet so that they might engage each other. Other admirers of the Pullman team claim the Argles is second to no football team in the United States this year. The Oregon Argles humbled the Michigan Argles and then lost to Oregon University, 9 to 0. W. S. C. beat Oregon 28 to 3. The coach at Pullman this year is William H. NATIVES DISPUTING RIGHT TO PROPERTY

Still unsettled in the district court is the case of Lucy Lindemann against Jimmie Young, which was an action started to secure the ejectment of the defendant from a house on Lower Front street known as the Old Chief Johnson House, a piece of property which has been in the courts off and on for the past eight or nine years. This case has been unusual in view of the facts that both the plaintiff and defendant were natives. The plaintiff claimed the property on the ground that she is a daughter of Chief Amakia-Hash and once before, in 1914, brought the matter into court as an equity case. The present action has been an ejectment proceeding in which the plaintiff was represented by J. G. Heid and the defendant by Hellenenthal & Hellenenthal. The case was tried before the following jury: J. H. Gilpatrick, H. T. Tripp, J. A. Sloane, P. W. Butters, J. T. Stephens, H. Heldorn, B. R. Leivers, E. Atckison, Fred H. Smith, Frank Carroll, Carl E. Lund, and W. R. Willis.

WHAT LANE SAYS ABOUT THE GOVERNMENT R. R.

Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the Interior, writes of Alaska in the New Republic "In a recent message to Congress President Wilson said of the Alaskan railroad that it "is only thrusting in the key to the storehouse and throw-

ing back the lock and opening the door. How the tempting resources of the country are to be exploited is another matter. The resources must be used, but not destroyed or wasted; used, but not monopolized under any narrow idea of individual rights as against the abiding interest of communities." "This is the keynote of our new policy in Alaska. Instead of allowing the vast riches of that great territory to be exploited at the haphazard will or whim of individuals and corporations intent only upon quick and large profits for themselves, we have set our faces to the task of developing Alaska and its resources in a large, sane and conservative manner suited to the magnitude of the interests at stake."

LEMON CREEK SOLD.

A quit claim deed has been filed at the Recorder's office closing the transfer of the Lemon Creek Power and Mines Company properties from that company to the C. O. Holding and Development Company of Delaware. The consideration is not given. This purchasing company filed its articles of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of Alaska just a few days ago.
