The anxiety and suffering that she probably has endured since her husband was taken away, was written on her face and she was an attentive listener to every bit of evidence offered by the witnesses.

### AN OCULIST ON THE QUESTION OF DROPS.

It is becoming more and more evident that "drops" are doomed. Even among ophthalmologists the use of drops in the examination of the eyes for diseases is passing. Significant of this fact is the recently made in the Philadelphia (Pa.) Evening Telegraph by Dr. L. K. Hirschberg, of Johns Hopkins College, in an inquiry. The doctor answers various questions, given by a medical character, in a special column published in a syndicate of papers. From this column, the following questions and answers are quoted:

"Can eyeglasses be fitted as well without drops as with, especially in speaking?"

"Very much better without drops, if specialists would only realize it. The eyes must be kept naturally dark between each lens-test, and the test must be made patiently, but quickly. The various 'drop' drops are responsible for so many mistakes made by the best oculists in fitting eyeglasses."
